FUTURE FIELD DAY MEETS.

The intercollegiate meet in track and field athletics, between Pomona College and the University of Southern California will take place at the new Athletic Park in Pomona on Washington's birthday. The revival of track contests between the leading Southern California colleges has aroused great interest among the local devotees of amateur sport. The first intercollegiate field day was held in 1893, and meets were held each year thereafter for six years. Owing to a disagreement among the college students no contest was held in 1899. Four schools—Occidental College, Chaffey Preparatory School, Pomona College and the University of Southern California, entered teams in all former contests. This year there will be a meet, in which the university and Pomona will enter teams. These colleges have developed sufficiently to outclass the smaller schools. Both the rival institutions are putting forth great efforts to secure the handsome trophy pennant, which goes to the winning team. A professional trainer is at work at Pomona, and the local team is being drilled by experienced teachers.

A local field day was held at Claremont last week. From the men winning in the local contest, the entries for February 23 will be drawn. Each school will enter two men in each event. As there will be eleven events quite a large-sized team will be required.

The stars were Avery, Sloan, Wharton and Lamb, all members of teams which heretofore have won in the intercollegiate contests and may represent Pomona College. Several new men of ability have appeared, notably, Hinckley, '03. The following were the events and results:

One hundred-yard dash—Won by Avery in 11s.; Gowan second, Wharton third.

Two hundred and twenty-yard dash—Won by Avery; Rood second, Gowan third; time 25s.

Four hundred and forty-yard run—Avery won, Adams second, Hinckley third; time 56s.

One-mile run—Won by Hinckley, Adams second, Voorhees third; time 5m. 5s.

One hundred-yard hurdle—Wharton won, Gowan second, Sloan third; time 14s.

Running broad jump—Wharton won, Bradley second, Hinckley third; distance 18ft. 6in.

Running high jump—Palmer won, Wharton second, Hinckley third; height, 5ft. 3¼in.

Sixteen-pound hammer throw—Won by Ven Huizen, Bradley second, Sloan third; distance, 95ft.

Pole vault—Sloan first, Voorhees second, Bent third; height, 8ft. 6in.

Sixteen-pound shot-put—Won by Suydam, King second, Waterman third; distance 32ft. 10in.

One-half-mile interclass relay—Four men entered by each college class, each man running 230 yards. The Sophomore team, King, Ven Huizen, Lamb and Gowan won; time 1m. 50s.

The University of Southern California will hold its local field day next Saturday. In the try-outs so far the men who have made the best showing are W. R. Guiberson, in the hurdles and high jump; Pettis in the pole vault; Carpenter and Crowell in the distance runs; M. G. Guiberson in the hammer throw and shot-put; Van Der Bergh, Ferguson and C. Enyeart in the sprints; Miller and Pettis in the broad jump; Braderson in the high jump. Several old men have been unable to train, and may not be entered in the intercollegiate event. How-

ever, the new men are doing conscientious work. and will make a good showing.

The Athletic Association of the University of Pennsylvania has fixed on Saturday, April 28, for its sixth annual intercollegiate relay race meet, and has issued invitations to all the colleges and universities in the United States and Canada to participate. There will be three races to determine the college championship of America, and they will be open to any college or university that desires to enter. The University of Pennsylvania, Harvard, Yale, Georgetown, University of Chicago, Michigan and others will also enter them. An effort will be made to arrange colleges in groups that are about equal in strength.
