

COLLEGE FIELD DAY.

U.S.C.-POMONA COMPETITION.

Today the athletes of the University of Southern California and Pomona College will meet on the Southern Pacific track at Santa Monica for their annual field day. The struggle promises to be the most interesting intercollegiate event held, for never before have the men been so evenly matched. The athletes of both teams have been thoroughly trained, and are in excellent condition. The order of events and the men who will represent their colleges therein are as follows:

The 100-yard dash: Pomona—Gowan and Cadwallader; U.S.C.—Fergusson and Woodward.

High jump: Pomona—Wharton and Gowan; U.S.C.—Miller and Broderon.

Shot put: Pomona—Kellogg and Ross; U.S.C.—Fergusson and Broderon.

The 440-yard run: Pomona—Hinckley and Newman; U.S.C.—Fergusson and Woodward.

Hammer throw: Pomona—Vanhuzen and Fairchilds; U.S.C.—Enyeart and Broderon.

Hurdle race: Pomona—Wharton and Gowan; U.S.C.—Miller and Broderon.

Mile run: Pomona—Hinckley and Adams; U.S.C.—Smith and Wilson.

Broad jump: Pomona—Noble and Cadwallader; U.S.C.—Miller and Enyeart.

Pole vault: Pomona—Noble and Voorhees; U.S.C.—Knowles and Enyeart.

Mile relay: Pomona—Fairchilds, Voorhees, Adams and Wharton; U.S.C.—Wilson, Woodward, Fergusson and Smith.

It will be seen that Pomona will have fourteen men on the track team, while U.S.C. will be represented by seven.

This is the reverse of the history of the intercollegiate contests, for hitherto Pomona has sent a small team, which has always secured a victory over the larger team from the university.

The Methodist collegians are hoping that the precedent of a successful small team will be unbroken this year, and that the cardinal and gold of the university will not again go down to defeat before the blue and white of Pomona.

There has been no material change in the teams since the estimate in last Monday's Times, and while in the individual contests either college may

attain an advantage of one or two points over the other, it is generally thought, in both institutions, that the result of the meet will depend upon which team is successful in the relay race. This contest, from the fact that upon it so much depends and on account of the character of the race itself, promises to be the most exciting feature of the meet. The race is for one mile, in which each man runs a quarter and from start to finish it is exciting.

Last year when the stick was given to Fergusson, who ran the last lap for the Methodist team, Gowan of Pomona had a lead of fifty yards, but in a magnificent run Fergusson gradually overcame the lead and crossed the tape first, thus winning first place for the U. S. C. relay team.

The Pomona students will come down from Claremont in a special car over the Santa Fé route, and the University delegation will leave University station on the Southern Pacific line at 9:15 a.m.

The events will begin promptly, so that spectators can take the special trains leaving Santa Monica at 5:30 o'clock.
