

COLLEGIANS' FINE FORM.

Excellent Records Made on Campus.

Big Coursing Stake for Next Sunday.

Game Association Will Meet. Golf Entries Close—Bowling Events.

The athletes of the University of Southern California held their trial field day on the college campus yesterday afternoon.

A large delegation of students, including many fair co-eds, came out to cheer the boys to their best endeavors and although neither the track nor the day was conducive to fast time, the sprinters made a creditable showing, breaking one intercollegiate record.

The first event, the 100-yard dash, was won by Wilson in a pretty race, Keagle second; time 10 3-4.

In the mile run, Fergusson won without effort, Leach second; time 4:50 3-4.

The next event was the shot put, and again Fergusson carried off the honors, sending the weight out 35 feet, H. Miller second.

D. Miller won the 40-yard run; time 14 seconds. Ellis took second place. Miller runs in good form, and should make better time.

In the pole-vaulting contest Knywart and Holman tied at 9 feet, Knowles second.

In the 220-yard dash, Seymour hit up a terrific pace at the start and left the bunch yards behind. Wilson also soon forged ahead, gradually lessening the intervening distance. A few yards from the tape he made a masterful effort, shot ahead of his opponent and won by a breadth; time 14 seconds.

Eighty-three feet and four inches was the best the boys could do in the hammer throw. Fergusson won, Hickford second.

Broderson won the high jump at 5 ft. 1 in. Jacobs took second place.

The 110-yard hurdle was one of the most interesting events of the day. Broderson, Jacobs and Knywart were the contestants. The men got a good start and ran evenly for about twenty-five yards, when Broderson caught his foot in a hurdle and fell. Jacobs and Knywart ran neck and neck until the last two hurdles, when Jacobs got the best of it by a yard, but he did not recover himself quickly after clearing the last hurdle, and by a splendid spurt Knywart shot ahead and crossed the line first; time 14 seconds.

Jacobs and Knywart were the only contestants in the broad jump. Knywart won; distance 18 ft. 3 in.

The last event of the day was the one-mile relay race, composed of two teams, the first consisting of Bleasford, M. Miller, Wilson and Fergusson, and the second of Kila, Keagle, Smith and Seymour. Hickford's team won after a lively contest. The time was 3 min. 51 1-4 sec., which breaks the intercollegiate record. The features of the race were the quarters run by Wilson and Fergusson.

Erwin Miller, who won the intercol-

legiate championship in the broad jump, was sick and did not take part in the meet. Dick Gusterson, who holds the record in the hurdle, was absent yesterday. These men will take part in the intercollegiate contest. There are also sure to be several challenges which may further change the personnel of the team from what it would be were the winners of yesterday's contest alone selected to compose the team that is to be sent against the Congregational sprinters on the third day.
