held its local field day yesterday afternoon on the campus. A very creditable

showing was made in the dashes. The field events were, with the exception of the hammer throw and shot-put, very

tame. Parsons proved a surprise in the 100 and 220-yard dashes. Townsend was picked for a sure winner, but Par-

sons won easily in the 100-yard, and, in spite of a poor start, captured the 220yard run in 24s flat.

Fergusson was the hero of the day in the field events. He won the shot-put easily at 34ft. 3in., and could evidently

have done much better. The hammer throw was the sensational event. Fergusson making the phenomenal throw of 125ft. Summary;
