

OCCIDENTALS ARE VICTORS.

Pomona Boys to Defeat After Game Struggle.

Roth Wreaks Champion's Wreak in Long Run.

Team for Trip North Has Been Selected.

Occidentals with its orange and black, in the face of what looked to be every-thing being against it, secured a victory from the blue and white of Pomona. The score was Occidental, 20; Pomona, 40; U.S.C. 30.

The U.S.C. was never a dangerous factor in the event, only serving to add uncertainty to the battle between the leaders.

The mediocre records were due to the poor condition of the track, and the fact that many of the contestants had grown weak in daily training by interruptions of the weather.

The adherents of the three institutions were out in force. Not until the last event did Occidental dare take a long breath when Hodge, Haderman, Hagerman and H.P.D. lined up in the mile relay race, gained victory after a heroic burst of speed. And who would not win with this phalanx of beauty and youth leaping down from the bleachers, calling to their favorites in exhorting terms, and roaring for victory.

There were scenes that brought vividly to mind historical accounts of Roman gladiatorial feats when death was preferable to defeat. Pomona athletes straining every muscle dashed in within a stride of victory to see the orange and black dart suddenly forward, to receive the cheers of the multitude, while they, taking strength with hearts refused longer to respond, fell prone across the finish line.

There were only boys out there at U.S.C. yesterday, but they were made of the right kind of stuff. Both Wilford and Moore merited admiration from their sires, and they received it.

It was in the two-mile race that the real performance of the day was witnessed. Johnson, Pomona's champion, was the favorite, and the chart figured him to win, but he lost only after his straining muscles refused longer to respond, and he went down in defeat covered with glory, falling senseless to the ground as the cheers of his teammates were calling him on to victory.

Johnson is frail; no one would pick him in a crowd for a long-distance man. His chest is thin and his limbs small. The boys came around the back turn with both about ten feet in the lead; as they neared the stretch, with what seemed to be superhuman effort the orange and yellow leaped ahead, both taking the lead about fifty feet from the tape and winning by about eight feet.

Every member of the winning team was in excellent condition, and it may be said that Wednesday is without a peer in the training line. Although the rain interfered and caused a postponement, Occidental never lost its enthusiasm.

This is Nader's first year in training a track team, and he is following closely in the steps of Coach Hooper, who has done so much for amateur athletes and especially for Pomona. The work of Lusher, Brown, Hiram and Manger stands out vividly to his credit.

Hopes of U.S.C. has been unfortunately in a lack of material this year, but has achieved much for his school. The work of Charlie Parsons, the champion 100-yard-man of the United States, speaks volumes for himself.

The honors of the day were divided equally between Hagerman and H.P.D. both wearing the orange and black of Occidental. Though handicapped with a sprained ankle, Hagerman took lead in the high and low hurdles and the broad jump. His time in the 100-yard and 200-yard hurdles equaled his former records. Owing to his injury he could do but 2 1/2, feet, in the broad jump, less than his mark a week ago on the same field.

H.P.D. secured the 100, 200, 400-yard sprints and was the only member of Pomona after one of the most exciting finishes ever witnessed. His time was slow in all of the events.

Victory in occasional features, and duplicating the dramatic ending of the two-mile event, was the half-mile run, in which Westerman, the star U.S.C. performer from Wisconsin, was beaten by Brown of Pomona, after he had led for one and three-quarter laps. Both boys fought it out gamely to the stretch, but Westerman was unable to respond to the last trying stride, and fell in a heap as he reached the line. Brown became light-headed and was several minutes recovering his mental equilibrium.
