

COLLEGIANS WIN MEET.

U.S.C. Defeats High School With Little Trouble.

Richardson and Comstock Break Records.

Methodists Predict Winning of Championship

U.S.C. won a sweeping victory over the Los Angeles High School in their track meet yesterday afternoon, the High School failing to take first place in a single event, and winning but 12 points out of a possible 111.

Richardson proved the star of the day. Wilhoit, the dependence of the High School, quit the game as a surrender to the superior forces against the High School talent.

Several records were broken yesterday, but as the meet was not an intercollegiate one, they made no stand. Comstock, who proved a wizard in the high hurdles, in which he is a novice, broke the Southern California record in this event, cutting it to 14 seconds flat, which is 2-5 lower than the previous one.

Richardson set a new standard in the pole vault, breaking the record of 10 feet 2 1/4 inches made by Wilhoit two years ago, by over two inches. Richardson negotiated 11 feet 2 inches without competition.

The mile in 5 minutes flat accomplished by Nordahl yesterday, is the best ever made by a U.S.C. man on this track, though the Methodists made better at Oakland.

The quarter-mile was an exciting event, a close contest between Lennox and Shute. Shute surprised his friends and justified the opinion of Coach Holmes by winning in this event, which he has but recently taken up at the request of the coach. The 220-yard was a race from start to finish, but only between U.S.C. sprinters. The leading High School man was fifth at the tape. Nine points were also scored by the college men in the short dash, with Shute winner by a good margin.

Holmes was very much pleased with the showing made by his team, though several of them were absent. Parsons and Cree were missed in the sprints, Klitten in the middle distance and Burek and Custin, strong men in the weights, did not enter. Chandler, the best broad jumper for the U.S.C., was another missing one.

The High School was handicapped by the absence of Seward and Goodwin, two speedy men, who would doubtless have added something to their total of points had they competed.

L. O. Thompson, coach for Whittier College, was at the meet yesterday, and in a conference with Coach Holmes, arranged for his men to meet the entire U.S.C. team, instead of only the preps, as had been previously decided upon. This meet will occur here four weeks from yesterday. Polytechnic will come to U.S.C. next Friday, and on Washington's Birthday, U.S.C. and Occidental will have a strenuous contest.
