

# QUAKER MILLS GOOD RUNNER.

## WINS MILE AND TWO-MILE IN THE U.S.C. MEET.

**Methodists Have no Trouble in Running up Big Score With Whittier—Unlucky Thirteen for Thompson's Men, Who, However, Put up Game Fight Against Big Odds.**

U.S.C. defeated Whittier College in the annual intercollegiate dual track and field meet yesterday morning, by the score of 104 to 13.

Two firsts and three thirds marked the total placing of the Quakers. In the remaining events the collegians won from the visitors with ease.

As expected, the speedy Mills annexed the distance runs with little difficulty in fair time. White plugged out a third in the same events. Henneker, in the low hurdles, finished a strong third. These points were the only ones gained by the Whittier aggregation. The relay was omitted, because the Quakers were unable to furnish a quartette.

Despite the lack of close competition, the varsity runners showed, on the whole, decided improvement over their last week's performances against Stanford, and with an additional week's training the Methodists are hopeful of bettering their first effort in company with Stanford.

Stokey appeared in the abbreviated trunks for the first time on the Methodist track, and showed latent ability in the weights and high jump. With a few weeks of faithful training, Stokey is expected to be a strong member of the team.

The mile run furnished the best race of the meet. Scott and Grant Richardson were pitted against Mills and White for the visitors, and the honors were kept even throughout the long grind. Grant took the lead on the pole, giving way to Mills, and White on the second lap. With Scott running a strong third, the quartette circled the third lap in a bunch. Gradually White and Richardson lagged, while Mills and Scott lead for first. Mills forged rapidly ahead, but Scott, in the last fifty yards, on a telling sprint, forced Mills to extend to his best efforts, Scott losing by a few feet. Richardson and White furnished a gritty finish for third place, White obtaining the lead in the last two yards.

In the century, Trotter surprised the enthusiasts by taking the lead for the first fifty yards, with Shute a poor third. The latter released himself in the final spurt, winning from Trotter by a yard in the fair time of 1:23.6a.

Another surprise came in the high hurdles, Holloway leading the field and winning by a good margin. Lennox and Burek brought up the remaining two places. Burek reversed the order of finish in the low sticks, winning from Lennox by a foot.

The two-mile event started with Cornwall in the lead. Mills and White allowed the Methodists to set their own pace for the first three laps, but Garbutt, fresh and strong, gave Mills the scare of his life in the final half lap. Mills barely caught the varsity runner in the last twenty yards, beating Garbutt to the tape by a few yards. White lagged in an easy third.

Richardson displayed good form in the hammer throw, his best effort registering 128 feet, 8 inches. Charlie lost to Trotter in the shot put, the southern champion making a fair put of 35 feet 7 inches.

Charlie Richardson set a new U.S.C. mark in the broad jump, clearing an even 21 feet as against his former record of 20 feet 8½ inches.

Thompson took the 220-yard dash in the good time of 33.5 seconds, the best time made by a Methodist runner this year. Shute jogged the quarter in 54.5 seconds, and could have bettered this mark a couple of seconds. Summary:
