

WINS EASILY.

U.S.C. BEATS WHITTIER.

U.S.C. 108, Whittier College 14.

A first by Mills in the mile over Ben Scott; a first in the two mile by White over Bousser and Martin, and thirds in the hammer throw, 220-yard dash, half-mile and mile events record the total points made by Whittier College against U.S.C. at Bovard field, yesterday.

In the other events the contest narrowed down to a spirited fight among the Methodist second-raters for their monogram positions, and several of the varsity athletes who have never been able to make a showing finished in the point places.

Burek was in fine form, winning a total of twenty-one points. He negotiated the low hurdles in the excellent time of 26 4-5 s., which equals the U. S.C. record made by Burek last year. Capt. Lennox was outdistanced in this event, although he ran his best to overtake speedy Stan. Lennox also tagged second to Burek in the high sticks,

Stan winning the trial in 10 3-5s. Goodsell copped the third place in both events, and Crites, the sole Whittier entry, was unable to do better than to push Goodsell for the last place.

Martin easily annexed the sprints, beating Reed and Ickes by a wide margin in the century, and duplicating the trick in the furlong in the good time of 24s. Martin is surely a find for the Methodists, and with a couple of weeks' training should prove a dangerous man in the conference meet. Blount and Feeler were the strongest Quaker contestants in the two events, Feeler grabbing a third from Ickes in the 220-yard event.

Mills proved the wise guy in the mile, winning from Scott in the slow time of 5m. 8 1-5s., setting his own pace the entire four laps and out-sprinting the Methodist in the final effort. Scott made the mistake of taking Mills' stride instead of following his own accustomed step, and although he stuck closely to Mills through the race he was unable to overtake the Quaker in the stretch. Sharpless and Dick followed far in the rear, willing to set a slower pace for second honors, the Methodist lacked the necessary stamina to finish, Sharpless taking third.

White started out strong in the two-mile with no serious opposition, and increased his lead to half a lap before he had circled half the distance. Bowser, Martin and Sharpless plugged around the weary laps for the remaining honors, and the handful of supporters realizing Bowser was about to win a monogram yelled encouragement to the runner. Martin had his eye on the second honors, however, and beat his tired teammate to the string, Sharpless being content with fourth place.

Newmire ran a strong race in the half mile, getting an excellent start, and sprinting the first quarter in 56s. He beat the Quaker on the stretch by forty yards. H. Gower surprised his teammates by beating Mills in the stretch by ten yards. The time was 2m. 44-5s.

The 'varsitans took three places in the high jump, pole vault, shot put, broad jump and 400-yard dash. In the relay race, the Quakers were unable to get together a quartette, and the 'varsity sprinters divided into two teams, the "fats" winning the half-mile race in 1m. 41-4-5s.

BLUE ROCK SHOOT.

Members of Crescent Gun Club Will Practice Today and Witness Work of Expert.

The Crescent Bay Gun Club will hold an informal shoot today on the club grounds at Venice, commencing at 9:30 o'clock, using traps sufficient in number to allow completion of sev-

eral events before the exhibition of W. A. Hillis at 1:30 p.m.

Among the experts who will compete are Harvey McMurtry, a world-famed shot; Gus Knight of San Bernardino, J. E. Vaughn of Orange, R. M. Arnold of Oxnard, Marcus G. Lane of this city, and a number of local marksmen and members of the club.

This meeting will serve as a warm-up for the registered shoot which will probably be pulled off about May 1 and 2.

W. A. Hillis, the noted all-around shot, will give a demonstration of his skill with rapid-fire weapons and modern ammunition at 1:30 o'clock this afternoon. Mr. Hillis shoots impartially at everything from a carpet tack to a polar bear, but his marksmanship will today be confined to objects not larger than a tomato can nor smaller than a needle. He uses rifles, shotguns and pistols, all of the auto-loading type, snap-shooting with high-power ammunition at targets thrown by himself, both singles and doubles, with remarkable accuracy.

Hillis has just concluded a tour through San Bernardino, Redlands and Riverside. He will also shoot at Long Beach tomorrow, at Ventura on Wednesday, and Santa Paula on Thursday, after which he will go North, and shoot at Ingleside at live birds.
