

# THREE ATHLETES IN TIE FOR INDIVIDUAL HONORS.

U S.C., 42 points; Pomona College, 30 points; Los Angeles High School, 15 points; S.C.A.C., 13 points; I.A.C., 10 points; Orange High School, 5 points; unattached athletes, 5 points; Redlands Y.M.C.A., 3 points; Whittier College, 1 point; Throop

Academy, 1 point; L.A.A.C., 1 point. No points were allowed for the relay races as they were special events.

Throop of U.S.C., Fischer of Pomona, and Johnson, I.A.C., tied for high individual honors, each winning 10 points. Donahue came second with 9 points.

Pomona College athletes brought the A.A.U. track meet at Bovard Field to a grand finale yesterday, when they forged ahead of the U.S.C. runners and won the intercollegiate relay race in 3m., 31.4-5s. The best trained athletes on the varsity squad ran till they were ready to fall, but the sagebrush quartette gained foot by foot until they finished with a five-yard lead.

"Casey" Wallace, the S.C. 440 man, ran a remarkable race and gained several yards on his opponent, but was unable to make up the long lead which the Claremonter had gained.

James Johnson an I.A.C athlete from Chicago, proved the "dark horse" of the meet, when he tied for individual honors by winning first place in the pole vault and high jump. Johnson is a clean-cut, pink-cheeked athlete, who was formally a big point winner in the Illinois Athletic Club.

He has done scarcely any training during the last winter, but he leaped over the cross bar high over his head in the high jump with perfect form and apparent ease.

The pole vault developed into the prettiest contest of the day, when Clarence Bean, "Babe" Giffen and James Johnson worked up to eleven feet, six inches. Giffen and Johnson both made this altitude, but Johnson won when they vaulted off the tie.

Pomona rooters went wild with delight when L. Gillette passed Leonard Martin, the crack U.S.C. runner, in the 220-yard sprint. Martin was running beautifully until he reached the curve, when he suddenly seemed to take a slump and the Claremont athlete passed him like a shot. "Len" spurted as they neared the tape, but was unable to catch his opponent. Martin stated after the race that the hot sun got the best of him and he lost his "pep" entirely and everything became blurred. He heard the Pomona runner pass him, however, and

this spurred him on to a final sprint.

The grammar school relay proved a walk-away for Thirtieth-street school.

Los Angeles High School defeated Throop Academy in the prep relay with ease. The hill-top boys seem to take to the relay race naturally. Many of them can run only an ordinary 440 race, but in a relay they are inevitable winners.

The mile and two-mile race was all Pomona. No other entries started. Harry Trotter, who holds the Southern California record of forty-five feet, four inches in the shot-put, competed, but showed the lack of training since he left school. He won the event with thirty-eight feet. Trotter showed his usual form, but lacked the steam to equal his old marks.

Eleven of the U.S.C. points were made by members of the preparatory schools. The varsity won the meet regardless of these points, however.

The crowd of 800 persons who witnessed the meet were evenly divided in their support. Each organization entered had its rooting representation and the enthusiasm that greeted every finish made it evident that somebody's favorite had won.
