

PURITANS BEAT POMONA'S TEAM.

*Eleven Firsts Against Four
Is U.S.C. Record.*

*Smith and Fischer Fight
Mile-Run Duel.*

*Sagebrushers Take the Relay
in Exciting Contest.*

U.S.C., 71 2-2 points; Pomona College, 37 2-3 points.

U.S.C. track athletes won the intercollegiate championship of Southern California yesterday when they completely upset all dope and overwhelmed the Pomona College runners after the latter had spent four hours riding and walking to reach Hayward Field on account of the washouts.

"Pete" Richardson started the 'varsity surprises in the first event when he took the hammer throw from Barnes by heaving the weight 127 feet 5 inches. From then on it was a Methodist landslide. The Puritans led from

the start and annexed eleven first places to their opponents' four.

The Sagebrush relay quartette partially redeemed the lost honors when it took the relay race by a three-foot margin in the last event on the programme. It was a spectacular race. Side by side the two racers, one in cardinal uniform and the other in blue, paced it around lap after lap.

Most of the way U.S.C. lead by a few inches, but seldom were the competing athletes more than two yards apart. Occasionally one of them would spurt forward and gain a few inches, but in most cases it was followed by a sprint by the opponent which brought the speedsters even again.

Wallace for U.S.C. started the last lap scarce a yard behind Gillette, the Pomona sprinter. It was a fight from the touch-off. Around the far side of the course the Sagebrusher lead. The space between them varied scarce an inch and both were running at a 20-yard clip.

The two-mile race was all Pomona. Fisher, Sturgis, Loveland and Warren loaded around the track after first "ditching" the U.S.C. competitor on the fourth lap. They talked to each other and joked as they hiked along, and had things all their own way.

Capt. Lorbeer for Pomona brought a

few seconds of joy to the hearts of the Claremont rooting section when he ducked over the low hurdles at a winning clip. He straddled the last obstacle exactly even with Stine, but that tow-headed little speedster forged ahead in the last strides and won. Stine said after the race that his tumble in the meet against Stanford last Saturday when he tripped over a hurdle seemed to haunt him every step of the race, and he almost fell over several of the hurdles.

Coach Stanton protested the 440-yard race, in which Walton and Wallace for U.S.C. took first and second, respectively. He claimed that the 'varsity athletes had "boxed" Sloane as they went around the first curve. As no inspectors saw the foul, the protest was not allowed.
