Pomona Wins Conference Track Meet at Baer Field With U.S.C. Second—Three Runners and Fall in Four Hundred and Forty Yard Dash.

Pomona, 64 2-3; U.S.C., 50 1-3; Occidental College, 19; Whittier College, 1.

New Southern California records were established in the mile relay and the 880-yard run, at the conference meet held at Occidental College, yesterday afternoon. The Pomona relay team lowered the record of 3:31 that has stood for several years, to 3:29 2-5. Walton of U.S.C. broke the record of 2:01 3-5 in the 880 and turned the distance in 2:00 4-5.

In the relay Hansen, who started for U.S.C., was beaten by Lorbeer of Pomona. Sloane, gor Pomona, started with a lead of three yards in the second lap, but Walton, running for U.S.C., passed him on the turn, handing a lead of about three yards to Wallace, the third runner for U.S.C. Capt. Lorbeer started after Wallace and they ran a gruelling quarter in which they kept about the same relative distance from each other for the first 300 yards, but in the home stretch Lorbeer came through with a burst of speed, handing a lead of about three yards to Gillette, who took the pole and ran a beautiful lap, showing his heels to Throop all around the track. and increasing his lead until he was about ten wards ahead at the finish.

In the 880 yard run Billings took the lead for Pomona and ran the first

ing 440 yard dash was nipped in the bud when Bradbeer of Occidental. Walton and Wallace of U. S. C. were thrown on the first turn as a result of the fierce fight for the pole that the men were making. About nine entries started the race. The track was not wide enough for them to all start on the same line and some of the men were placed on a line in the rear of the first five men. When the men reached the first turn some one crowded in and upset the three runners. and spiked McDonald of Occidental. Wallace and Walton did not attempt to continue the race, but Bradbeer of Occidental got up and ran a game fourth. Lorbeer of Pomona was not interfered with on the turn as he had the pole. After the accident he continued his race and finished within one-fifth of a second of the Southern California record, running the distance in 51 4-5s., the fastest time record for the long sprint this season.

The U. S. C. rooters suffered a severe disappointment when Throop, the cinder path hero of the Methodist school, went down to defeat before Gillette of Pomona in the 220 yard The race was run in 22 4-5s., dash.
