

MANY ENTRIES FOR A.A.U. MEET.

*More Than a Hundred Men
Ready to Show.*

*U.S.C. Team Will Probably
Be Victorious.*

*Clary Bunch of Sprinters in
Century Dash.*

All is in readiness for the annual A.A.U. cluster classic. The entry list has been closed with more than 100 names registered. This does not come up to the total of last season, but there is as much class entered as ever before, if not a little more. There have been many A.A.U. meets, but the one which is to take place Saturday afternoon on Harvard Field, presents the most unique feature in the history of amateur athletics in this particular branch.

The U.S.C. Trojan track and field

team is practically pitted against the power of the Southwestern athletes in this meet. In the past there have been a great many more unattached entries and also many more club athletes on the list, but this season nearly all the stars come from the local intercollegiate stables.

U.S.C. SHOULD WIN.

The University of Southern California has entered a strong, well-balanced team and should easily carry off first honors, but the athletes from Pomona and Oxy have been figuring on laying the Trojans low. For this reason the fans are likely to see some very keen competition. It is the idea of the U.S.C. athletes to score more points in this meet than all the rest of the teams entered. It is a big task and if accomplished will prove that the Trojans have the greatest track and field squad in the history of southern athletics.

EVENTS TO START EARLY.

There are a few important announcements to be made concerning the running off of the meet. The first event will be started at 2 p.m. All contestants are requested to report to Bob Weaver, clerk of the course, between noon and 1 o'clock, in order to get their competition numbers. All grammar school athletes are to report and register on the field. All the High School relay teams, except that of the Los Angeles High School, are also requested to report before 1 o'clock.

The Los Angeles Athletic Club Marathon road race will be finished in front of the bleachers after a six and a half mile grind around the U.S.C. track. The Marathon runners should finish the race between 1:15 and 1:45 o'clock.
