

TROJANS SWEEP FIELD IN GREAT A.A.U. MEET.

Sherman Indians Win Marathon, Ray Breaking National Record—Beebe of Anaheim High Stars in Distance Races—Gillette Wins Sensational 440—U.S.C. Team Shows Wonderful Strength.

THE University of Southern California track and field team swept all before it in the annual A.A.U. cinder classic yesterday afternoon on Harvard Field. The Trojan knights made more points than all the rest of the contestants put together, coming out of the struggle with a score of 72, while the combined scores of the other teams only totaled 44.

Pomona came second with 21. Anaheim High School took third with 19 units, due to the wonderful work of that prep school star, Beebe, who won the mile and the 810-yard run. Occidental took third, with 8 points;

San was running without any apparent trouble.

BEEBE STARS.

When the runners came through the gate on the fourth and final lap, Beebe jumped into the lead with a terrific sprint, which he started easily 250 yards from the finishing tape. He kept up the pace and won in a canter, with a lead of twenty yards and running fresh.

The little fellow was cheered to the echo for running two varsity men off their feet. Linton Smith of U.S.C. was unable to enter, as he was taken ill the night before the meet, but even the mighty captain would have had to run his best to win yesterday.

While speaking of this Anaheim wonder, it might be well to tell how he won the 180-yard run, defeating Tipton, the U.S.C. veteran. Beebe finished in 2 minutes, 1 and 4-5 seconds, running his first lap in 57 seconds flat. This was what turned the trick.

There was one other big thrill and that was the battle royal between Gillette of Pomona, Hodge of U.S.C., and Jackson of U.S.C., in the 440-yard dash. The three stars went through the gate in a dead heat and when they came out on the other side of the field, Gillette had forged to the front by a terrific sprint.

All the way down the back stretch the three struggled with only three

RAY WINS MARATHON.

The Sherman Indian school scored a remarkable victory in the annual L.A.A.C. marathon road race, taking first and second. Albert Ray was first, finishing the ten miles of the course in the fast time of 57 minutes and 19 seconds, breaking the national record of 58 minutes flat. Zeyouma, the other Indian, took second, with George Haggart third, and Brewster of Pomona College, fourth. The race belonged to the two native sons from the crack of the starter's pistol to the tape. Ray led out with a great burst of speed and was never headed. Zeyouma was second all the way and was never in danger at any time from the other contestants.

Ray got off the course on entering the last leg of the road portion of the race and was forced to run two extra laps around the track to make up his lost distance; however, he covered the even ten miles in record-breaking time and proved, beyond a doubt, that he is the greatest long distance runner in the history of athletics in Southern California.

Zeyouma made a great showing, breaking inside of 1 1/2 minutes and also proved that he is the next best runner at the long grinds that has ever put on a shoe in the South.

A.A.U. MEET STARTS.

When the last straining marathon runner had crossed the finish line, the A.A.U. meet was started with the grammar school 100-yard dash, which went to a youngster from Burbank, Palmer by name, in 18 and 1-5 seconds. He is some little goer and if he does not burn himself up before reaching High School, will be another Throop or Johnson.

The open 100-yard dash developed Waldo Throop of U.S.C. as the winner, with Larry Gillette of Pomona second and Bradley of U.S.C. third. Bill Carrigan figured in this race until the final 25 yards, when his legs went back and he did not place. Gillette was last man at the 50-yard mark, but pulled up to second place before the tape was reached. Throop won an easy race, coasting in at the finish, but proving that he has come back and will be one of the Trojan track features this season.

Clemmer Johnson of L.A. High, waded through the High School 100-yard dash winning his heat and also the final without any apparent effort. Clemmer is coming this season and should make some of the big ones jump before he is through.

The first real sensation of the afternoon came in the mile run. For three laps, Sturgis of Pomona, led Beebe, the Anaheim boy, and it looked as though the collegian was going to win easily and that Torrance of U.S.C. would take second, as the Tro-

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yards between them, but Gillette won the race to the pole on the last turn.

Here Hodge began to pick up the distance. Jackson had been running on the outside all the way, and instead of taking the pole ahead of Hodge on the last turn, called to his team-mate to close up. If he had sprinted in front of Hodge, he would have boxed him at that stage of the race, and the result would have been disastrous.

However, the three came into the home stretch with Hodge picking up the distance a foot at a time, but at the finish Gillette still had six inches to the good, so won the race by a scant breadth. Jackson ran a great race and deserves a world of credit for helping his team-mate out.

The two-mile went to Swigget of U.S.C. During the first six laps he was having a great time with this Indian, Ray, who had been entered at the last minute, but at the end of the sixth lap, Ray misunderstood the sign of his trainer and stopped, thinking the race was over, leaving Swigget to win by at least 200 yards from the rest.
