

# TROJANS WIN FROM TIGERS.

*U.S.C. Team Is Too Strong  
for Game Oxy Squad.*

*Borgstrom Breaks Record in  
the Pole Vault.*

*Beckes Wins Three Firsts in  
Field Events.*

U.S.C., 83½; Occidental, 46½.

The U.S.C. track and field team, running true to form in almost every event, easily defeated the Occidental aggregation in the annual dual meet yesterday afternoon on Baer Field. The outcome of the meet was a foregone conclusion, as far as the victory was concerned, but the Tigers were able to score about eleven more points than was expected of them. This was due to the excellent work of Beckes in the field events and some bad luck, which befell Kelly of U.S.C. in the low hurdles.

Charlie Borgstrom of U.S.C. was the record-breaking star of the meet. After the Trojans had annexed the first three places in the pole vault, Borgstrom went on and broke the Southern California record with a jump of 12ft. 6in. He cleared the bar nicely and looks to be the best pole vaulter ever developed in the South.

BECKES IS A STAR.

Beckes, Occidental's animated string bean, was easily the individual star of the meet, his work in the broad jump and discus throw coming as a complete surprise to the followers of the sport. He figured to win the high jump with Ben Ward out of the running and probably would have won it anyway, as Ward is not in good shape at the present time.

In the broad jump he defeated

Earl with a leap of 21ft. 7in. Last Saturday Earl defeated Beckes at 21ft. 9in., but the Trojan seemed unable to get his form on the Tiger field.

The surprise came in the discus

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throw, when Beckes defeated Leo Livernash with a throw of 111ft. Leo has been making better marks than this in practice, but seems unable to come through in competition. Hal Clamment of U.S.C. was not in the meet, but it is doubtful he could have beaten Beckes yesterday, as the latter was in splendid fettle.

## LINTON GETS REVENGE.

Linton Smith came into his own yesterday, defeating Bill Annin, the pride of Oxy, in the mile. Last year in this meet Annin trimmed Linton easily, and Smith was out for revenge. The time was slow, probably due to the rather raw wind on the back stretch, but Smith was expecting a sprint from Annin on the last lap, but the latter evidently was not in good shape as the sprint failed to materialize and Smith came in an easy winner.

The 100-yard dash was a surprise for the first sixty yards of its course. Baer of Oxy was ahead of Throop at this stage of the race, but the little Trojan veteran put on his famous finish and breasted the tape first. Baer got a good start and Throop a poor one, which likely had something to do with the event, but at that, Baer ran

a beautiful 160. Three of the timers caught the men in 15 flat, while two stopped their watches at 10.3, so the slower time was given out as official, although the race looked quite a bit faster.

Fred Kelly took first in the high hurdles, finishing in 15.4s. He did not seem to have his form in the race, but his great natural speed carried him through. Kirkpatrick of Oxy finished second, running a good race. Stewart of Oxy and Taylor of U.S.C. were both disqualified for knocking over the barriers, so did not place.

Big "Ash" Hendrick of the Trojan band won the hammer-throw with McNary and McDonald of Oxy second and third, respectively. Hendrick had a little trouble staying in the ring, but easily won in the final throw. The big fellow is steadily improving and should better his mark of 126ft. 8in. made in this meet.

## WAR IV FOUR-FORTY.

The quarter-mile almost developed a riot. Jackson of U.S.C. breezed in a winner in 51 3-8s., Cook of Oxy taking second with a great sprint in the last 150 yards. Berger of U.S.C. was forced into third place on the back stretch, due to the fact that John Creighton of Occidental uncorked a terrific sprint in an attempt to gather some Trojan goats. Jackson heard him coming and let out with a great burst of speed and was not passed, but Berger was caught and on the third stretch was nearly shoved off the track in trying to get by Creighton. Cook pulled up at this point and came steaming in only a few yards behind Jackson. If the Oxy man had started his sprint sooner, he might have had a chance, but the son of Ham was running in magnificent form and would probably have won in any event.

Throop and Bradley, both of U.S.C., took first and second, respectively, in the 250-yard dash. Throop was in the lead all the way, though for a time it looked as if Baer might give him another hard "rind," but the speedy Tiger blew up in the last thirty yards, Bradley coming up with a good finish for second. Yakeley of Oxy, was third, as Baer fell badly behind at the finish.

The next event was the discus throw, and here Beckus wound himself around the disc and when he un-  
him the weight fell 111 feet, which was enough to win.

## FRED KELLY WRECKED.

The 220-yard low hurdles developed a wreck of some magnitude. Fred Kelly, the mighty, lost his stride on the sixth hurdle, stumbled to the seventh, where he fell, cutting a great gash in his hip and knee. Kelly's fall messed up Laird and Hodge, the other U.S.C. entries, with the result that Kirkpatrick and Stewart, of Oxy, finished first and second, in the order named.

This was a terrible set-back to the Trojan dope sheet, but was a repetition of last year in the matter of hard luck. A year ago Kelly threw a shoe in this race, giving the same two Tigers first and second.

Tipton of U.S.C. won the 880 in 2 minutes and 4-5 seconds. Pettit of Oxy came up in the last lap and nearly caught the flying Trojans, but Tipton had too much finish left and the

Tiger could not make up the lead gained on him in the first lap. Tipton apparently did not extend himself in this race, while Pettit could have done better had Bill Annin been running with him.

## KELLY COMES BACK.

The shot put went to Fred Kelly, who made a put of 41 feet, 2 and 1-4 inches, after his bad accident in the low hurdles. This showed that the big Trojan has the grit, even if his luck is not the best in the world. Drury Wiseman of Oxy took second, with a heave which was well beyond 40 feet, which shows that the Tiger is coming.

Swiggett, Torrance and Walbridge tied for first place in the two mile, giving U.S.C. nice points. Swiggett led out with a fast half-mile, but soon saw that there was no need of a record-breaking pace, so slowed up in order to finish with his team mates. The broad jump brought Beckus to light again, and he once more needed five points and first place for the Tigers, in the high jump.

The day was brought to a close with the relay. The U.S.C. team was with yards to spare. Berger and Yakeley ran the first lap, Berger winning for his team and putting Ira Courtney out in front. Courtney ran a good lap, but did not extend himself. His bad tendon was troubling him a little, but he gave Hodge a lead over Craighton, Hodge increasing the lead materially, running a great lap, finishing in 51 2-5 seconds. Cook of Oxy started after Jackson of U.S.C. in the last lap, with a fine burst of speed. Jackson had been told that Cook was dangerous, so he came through with a lap in 51 seconds flat. Cook ran a good race, but was helpless against the speedy Jackson. He showed remarkable form in this race and finished with a wonderful sprint.
