

DREW EQUALS WORLD RECORD.

Teary Through Two-Twenty in Fast Time.

U.S.C. Beats Pomona in Meet of Thrills.

Have Get Away with a Speedy Relay Mark.

CLAREMONT, Feb. 23.—As had been expected, U.S.C. defeated Pomona College on Alumni Field here today by the score of 23 to 22. Though the score would indicate a rather one-sided contest, there were many thrilling finishes and upturns in the bleachers was at least the while time.

The most noteworthy happening of the day was when Drew, the colored sprinter of U.S.C., tore down the two-twenty straightaway, with Larry Gillette at his heels, breaking the tape in 21.1-4 seconds. This ties the world's record held by H. J. Wafers of Georgetown and H. C. Craig of Michigan.

In the hundred the sprinting demons tried too hard and as a result his efforts caused him to lose form and he was clocked at 24-8 for the race. That Drew can thank Gillette for pushing him so hard in the two-twenty is the opinion of Dean Crowwell and others.

GILLETTE CLOSE.

The Pomona captain hung right to the colored marer's flank all the way past the bleachers. Drew used every measure of speed in his body but only gained when Gillette showed down at the finish to save himself for the relay. The watches caught the Pomona man at 22.2-5, which equals the old Southern California record, made by Thorpe of U.S.C. on the Pomona track in 1918.

Although Drew was really the sensation of the day, winning the broad sweep as well as both dashes, others took into the limelight as well. Turkey broke the Pomona College record in the shot-put, with a heave of 46 feet, 10.1-4 inches. Pomona scored a shut-out in the mile with the two Sturges brothers running a dead heat, and Hawley taking third after a same race. The time 4:10 2-5, could have been lower had the older Sturges so desired. Kelly and Ward had things pretty much their own way in the high hurdles and the same was true of the Trojan leader and laid in the low sibs. Kelly won the high in 22 4-8 and the low in 22 seconds flat, which equals his best time in the latter event, although his previous mark was made on a curved track. Pomona men took third place in each of the barrier events.

GREEN SHINES.

In the quarter, George Green the sage-hen freeman phenom, jumped in the lead with the crack of the starter's pistol and was never headed, winning his race handily in 21.1-2 seconds. The pole vault was all U.S.C. Watkins was at 117. 1/2, with Cookman and Boffinger sharing in the order named. Burkstrom cleared 105. 1/2 in. in addition, but failed to clear over the bar at 117. after four attempts. This was the only event in which the Sage-hens did not place.

THE RELAY.

Fowleson and Franklin led out for their respective colleges with the Sage-hen on the pace. He made the lap in 22.2-5 and headed Clary a two-yard lead over Kelly. The Blue and White runner tore around the curve ten yards ahead of the Orange here, but Kelly was equal to the occasion, and gave Courtney a five-yard lead on George Green.

The little Sage Hen caught and passed Courtney, however, making the quarter in 16 3-16. Clary, with a ten-yard lead, increased it to twenty and was clocked at 48 2-16. for the lap. The time for the mile was 16 1-16, which equals three seconds from the Pomona College record, and approaches within one-fifth of a second of the Southern California record, held by Laird, Hodges, Kelly and Jackson of U.S.C.

Coach Steiner was well pleased with the showing made by his team. Crowwell was also delighted with the outcome, as well as the good feeling which characterized the meet and the manner in which it was handled. A.A.U. officials conducted the meet and as great pains were taken to insure the accuracy of the distance and time of Drew's fast 200, his return will doubtless stand.
