

DREW AND KELLY TOO MUCH FOR BERKELEY.

Howard Drew's Unexpected Showing in the Broad Jump Turned the Tide for the Southern University and Berkeley Suffered Second Successive Defeat at Trojan Hands.

US.C. 67 1-3; California, 54 2-3.
To Howard Drew and Fred Kelly of Olympic fame, especially the former, must be given the credit for U.S.C.'s second successive track victory over the Berkeley Bears.

Kelly's feat of grabbing firsts in both hurdles and shot put was expected, as he has formed that habit long since, but when Drew came to the rescue in the broad jump and with a Herculean effort cleared 22ft. 8in., practically clinching the meet for the Trojans, the crowd went wild.

The meet was one of surprises and near-surprises.

The mile was rather tame, as Harry Wood came trotting in 100 yards ahead of Wright of California in the splendid time of 4:26 1-5. The 100-yard dash showed Drew well out in front, with Jimmy Threlkeld running Fred Kelly a terrible race for second, the Trojan barely nosing him out.

The high hurdles came near causing some of Kelly's admirers to die of strangulation. Ben Ward, a strange apparition in brand-new yellow pants, startled the crowd by getting away well in front of the field. Preble of California shied at the bright colors and gouged up the track with his nose at the third hurdle.

KELLY'S NARROW ESCAPE.

Ward continued on his colorful way and at the seventh barrier was a good three yards ahead of Kelly. Here the champion took the bit in his teeth and slowly pulled up on the flying Ward, beating him to the tape by inches in 15 2-5.

Ned Franklin once more won the 440-yard dash for his team-mate Laird, by forming a neat box into which George Clark rushed, and forcing the California man to run yards out of his way to pass him. Clark made a valiant effort, but couldn't make up the lost distance.

The two-mile run was a crime, three Blue and Gold runners playing with Charley Swiggett and alternating in the lead until the little Trojan with a worried grin was forced to drop back into fourth place and come in a little forlorn figure, 150 yards in the bad. Zelle apparently could have speeded up indefinitely and finished beautifully.

Laird's vaunted speed in the low hurdles failed to materialize, the speedy Trojan being forced into second place by Kelly, who really loafed the last twenty yards and yet did 25 2-5 for the distance.

The 880 was one of the sensational races of the day. Tipton won the

race by using his head. Crabbe and Cuendett, the California pair, lit out like a couple of scared jack rabbits and had a comfortable lead at the end of the first lap, but as they hit the last turn the pace began to tell and the long striding Trojan passed them up in a snorting finish, clipping one-fifth of a second from the Southern California intercollegiate record.

BORGSTROM INJURED.

In the meanwhile the pole vault was dragging along and everybody in the bleachers was so busy trying to stifle yawns that when Borgstrom, the great Trojan pole vaulter, fell and sprained his ankle, hardly a person in the grand stand noticed him.

The string-bean Trojan has already won the event at 12 ft., and was attempting to clear the bar at 13 ft. On his second attempt, Borgstrom, who is as graceful in going over the bar as a mess of fried potatoes being tossed by a second-rate chef, fell sprawling in a heap, his ankle twisted beneath him.

Not till a mob of officials, with Uncle Lewis in the van, rushed to the side of the Trojan did the crowd realize that something serious had happened and when he was carried from the field it seemed hard to realize that the splendid vaulter had probably competed for the last time this year.

RELAY'S BAD LUCK.

Bill McFie dampened the ardor of the northerners considerably when he went out of the high jump at 5ft. 9in., about five notches below his accustomed height. Ward's loud pants stood him in good stead in this event as he tied for second by lighting on the bar and bouncing off, the bar wobbling up and down wildly but remaining on the pegs. Luther Nichols won the event at 5ft. 11in.

The Trojan relay team continued its unbroken record of defeat, Laird finishing some twenty-five yards behind Straub. George Clark got revenge on Franklin by leaving him five yards in the rear on the first lap. Bradway ran the lead up to twenty on King, a newcomer in the Trojan ranks.

Fred Kelly and Leo Meyer ran about even, the Trojan falling back in the first part of the race but pulling up at the end. Straub had a good twenty yards on Laird, who lit after him as though he would overhaul him in the first half of the race. He gained considerable ground early in the lap, but faded when he hit the stretch and Straub finished well in the lead.
