

# TROJANS MAKE CLEAN SWEEP.

*Dark Horse Neighs Loudly at Track Meet.*

*Occidental Beats Pomona by Two Points.*

*Kirkpatrick Beats Kelly in Low Hurdles.*

The neigh of the dark horse was heard abroad in the land yesterday afternoon when the U.S.C. Trojans literally buried the Pomona and Occidental track squads under an avalanche of points.

Barring the races and events absolutely conceded to certain stars, and even in some of these, the dark horses were forcing their noses into the public gaze.

When a man with a "wooden" leg plays baseball all morning and then runs away from Kelley in the low hurdler in 25 1-5 as Kirkpatrick of Occidental did, or when men like Paul Pritchard, Larry Gillette, Fred Watkins and Cyril Tipton are shoved into the background, it is indeed time to sit up and take notice.

**TROJANS SWEEP FIELD.**  
 The Trojans had everything their own way from start to finish. They set up an 8 to 1 point lead over Pomona in the first event, and from that point on, they were never in danger. Occidental nosed out Pomona by two points, the final score being Occidental 29 1-3 and Pomona 27 1-3.

The 100-yard dash, the opening event, was run against a strong wind and here came the first surprise, when Bradley of U.S.C. nosed out Gillette of Pomona for second. Drew loafed across in front in 10 2-5s.

Another upset came when Bailey of U.S.C. won the hammer throw from Wieman of Occidental and Redy Heath of Pomona kicked in with a third place.

The mile run was a cooked-up job that failed to be cooked. Bill Annin, wishing to save himself for the 880, fixed it up to let Pritchard win the mile. For three laps Weller of U.S.C., Pritchard and Annin of Oxy and Walt Sturges of Pomona loafed around the track.

The last lap was an awful thing. Pritchard lit out like a scared rabbit with Annin right at his heels. Right here, Sturges spoiled the little job by going right after the Tiger runners like a shot. As they entered the stretch, Sturges passed Pritchard and Annin, seeing that his team-mate couldn't win, let out a link and beat Sturges to the tape by a couple of yards.

**COSTLY VICTORY.**  
 The effect of Walter Sturges's sprint was shown in the two-mile when Pritchard, unaccustomed to running a lap in 57s., came out tired and after trailing Dave Sturges all the way, was forced to take second to him in slow time.

The finish of the race was the closest of the meet. For the entire lap Pritchard hung on the Hun's heels. As they came into the stretch he seemed to pull even with him and for seventy yards the two weary boys sprinted, a final lunge at the tape giving first to Sturges by six inches.

Georgis Green of Pomona had too much pep for Laird and Cook in the 440. Laird got the pole and kept it until the stretch, when the Hun ran away and left him. Johnny Cook got a cramp on the back stretch, which showed him that riding ten miles on a bicycle delivering papers on the morning of a big meet, doesn't help his muscles any.

**EVENT OF MEET.**

The 880 was the big event of the meet and Bill Annin showed himself to be a real champion by running away from Tipton. In the really wonderful time of 2:01 3-5. There

was a terrific end on the back stretch, but the sucky little Tiger never faltered, and finished with a spurt that left Tipton five yards to the bad.

Harry Kirkpatrick, the Occidental captain, running with his leg bandaged tightly, set up a five-yard lead on Kelly before the low hurdles were half over, and floated across the tape in 25 1-5. Kelly pulled up close at the finish. Laird finished third, but after a caucus of judges had been called, he was disqualified for running in three lanes at once and third given to Green of Pomona.

Kirkpatrick was the most surprised individual of all as he had practically thrown away his chances by playing baseball against Redlands in the morning.

George Bettinger of U.S.C. was a regular dark horse in the pole vault, clearing twelve feet at his first trial and leaving Watkins and Cookman of U.S.C. and Coffeen of Occidental to scrap it out for third.

They each took a shot at it and missed. Cookman tried to take the pole over with him by wrapping his leg around it, but failed.

Fred Kelly was the big noise in the high hurdles, nosing out Ben Word for first in the marvelous time of 15 1-5 seconds with a wind blowing in his face that threatened to blow him over the fence every time he left his feet.

The Trojan captain had a big day all around, his conquest in the low hurdles being the only mar on it. He took just one jump in the broad, disdainfully scorning even to watch it measured and took second place with it. The shot encroached upon Kelly's valuable time only sufficiently for him to get in one good put.

**BICKFORD SURPRISES.**

One real feature of the meet was the winning of third place in the two-mile by John Bickford of Occidental. Hitherto Jawm has made it a rule to enjoy a view of the race from the rear of the bunch, but yesterday in his last race representing Occidental, he ran like a champion, only a few feet behind Pritchard.

Pomona ran away with the relay, while Occidental sprang a big surprise by again beating U.S.C. Brigham Young of U.S.C. gave King a three-yard lead over Green of Pomona and a seven-yard lead over Montijo of Occidental. Green and Montijo both tore off speedy laps and Gillette started and finished with a ten-yard lead over Cook of the Tigers.

The meet was really a model.

There was class to everything from the competition to the officiating. Fred Thomson and Jim Donohue, the two best all-round athletes in the country, gave demonstrations of how regular athletes behave by exhibitions with the hammer and discus. Freddie heaved the hammer ten feet farther than the winning throw, using only one hand in the operation.
