

# CALIFORNIA SHINES IN GREAT EASTERN MEET.

**F**RANKLIN FIELD, PHILADELPHIA (Pa.) April 25.—In the twentieth annual relay races held under the direction of University of Pennsylvania this afternoon, the University of Southern California was the most conspicuous team on the field.

Of the seven field events the University of Southern California's team won four firsts and two third places. What makes their decided victory all the more wonderful, is the conditions under which they performed. A cold drizzling rain, fanned by a stiff breeze, made the attempt to smash records almost impossible.

True to the advance dope, Drew romped home an easy winner in the hundred-yard dash in 10s., flat. In order to make it a good day, he leaped out twenty-two feet in the broad jump and was awarded first place.

Kelly outclassed the field in the hurdles and was a winner in 15 3-5s. His team-mate, Ward, finished third, right on the heels of F. Ward of University of Chicago. Borgstrom, the phenomenal young vaulter from California, upheld his reputation by winning first in the pole vault, with a vault of 12ft. Watkins, his team-mate, entered the pole vault, but was

forced to withdraw on his second attempt on account of his injured ankle giving out.

Ward, the lanky California youth, made a very good showing in his two events. He finished third in the high hurdles and tied for third place in the high jump. Of the five athletes sent East by the California Institution every one placed in his event with the exception of Watkins, and if it had not been for his untimely injury, judging from his past performances, he would have certainly placed with his team-mate, Bergstrom; in this event.
