

TROJANS LOSE TO FRESHMEN.

Berkeley Babes Pile up Big Score.

Draw is Early Feature of the Meet.

Southerners Fall Down in Field Events.

BERKELEY, March 21.—Not even the winning of five first places and a half-dozen second places by U.S.C. against the freshmen today sufficed to overbalance the scoring power of numerous thirds and seconds made by the California men. The freshman won by a score of 72 to 49.

The unexpected strength shown by the first-year men in the field events swung them the victory even before the races were finished. The southern shot-patters were completely outclassed by the babes, who took all nine points. The distance, 437 ft. 3 in., is a freshman record.

Haller had one of his uncertain days and was defeated by Gildersleeve in the hammer throw. Draw was the only U.S.C. man to get a first-spot in the field events—that came in the broad jump.

DREW SCORES FIFTEEN.

As was to be expected, Draw was the star of the meet. He alone won fifteen points. Kelly came second with ten, while Bradley, with second in both 100 and 200, garnered in six points. Draw was partly responsible for Bradley's points, even then. In both sprints Draw swarttered along, pulling and pushing Bradley, who was working hard. Part of the time the champion was looking over his shoulder. He tickled the local fans immensely.

Kelly had no trouble in the hurdles, though he appears to work rather harder than usual, and seems to be somewhat out of condition.

Watson, relay, and later quarter-mile when a man was needed for the relay, had no chance whatsoever with Beebe. The Anaheim boy led the field for the last lap, and Watson was beaten for second by a skinny freshman in the sprint for the tape.

NO SHAPE.

The quarter-mile gave U.S.C. one point, when Johnson landed a slow third. Johnson and Young provided the thrill of the race by their fight for this one point.

Torrence was in no shape to run the two-mile. He fought every inch of the long grid and at three it seemed that he would plunge headlong into the track. If sheer pluck ever landed a place it did in this case.

The expected close race between Tipton and Beebe in the half-mile did not materialize. Beebe soon got the pole and kept the lead consistently. Toward the finish Tipton turned loose his sprinting powers, but he was unable to press Beebe enough to become dangerous.

SLOW TIME.

All of the three made were very slow, because of the condition of the track and due to the fact that the southern stars did not attempt to exert themselves when they found that they had the points secure. Had the U.S.C. field men and distance men been able to back up the work of the track men the score might have been different. Weakness in the field events and distances accounts for the defeat.

EXHIBITIONS.

With the exception of Draw and Kelly, the U.S.C. team will leave for Los Angeles on Friday afternoon. Draw and Kelly are to remain in the north to run exhibition races at the Inmate meet on Saturday.

Draw is to run the 100-yard dash against Nells and Newhall of the Olympic Club. Both of these sprinters are 18 1/2-46 men. Draw states that if the track is in condition he will attempt to make a record in the 100.

Kelly competes against three Stanford hurdles—Murray, Norton and Templeton. Kelly has been strongly advised by his team-mates to stay out of this race, as he is not in condition for hard competition. Kelly says that he will compete.
