

DREW AND KELLY BEAT OCCIDENTAL AT TRACK.

Champions Entertain — Tipton Goes into Quarter and Stages a Sprint that Cook Cannot Follow — Annin Wins Mile and Stops to Let Team-mate Earn Letter in Half-mile — Little Competition.

MESSRS. FRED KELLY and Howard Drew of the University of Southern California entertained on Baer Field yesterday afternoon. As a result, U.S.C. defeated Occidental 75 2-3 to 55 1-3 in a track meet.

A number of amateur athletes who will never be accused of being professionals tried to horn in on the spotlight, but it was no use.

Figuring on past experiences and traditions, I went out expecting to see

some blood shed, but there wasn't even a nose bleed. The majority of the events were absolutely void of competition. The track events resembled a series of runaways on a paved street with no traffic cops on the job.

THE RANS.

In the 100 and 220 Drew ran away from everything. Cook of Occidental deserves great credit for beating Bradley out for second in the 220, but it was all Drew in both races.

There was more competition in the quarter than in any other race. Tip-

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ton ran a great 440, and in Cook of Occidental he had a hard man to beat.

Bill Annin, in the 880 and mile, was as much of a runaway as Kelly was in the hurdles and Drew in the sprints. After taking the 880 Annin stopped and allowed McBurney to run in with first place so that he could win his coveted "O," but in the mile Annin showed what he had.

Torrance ran a nice race in the two-mile number and finished with a strong sprint, but even Huddleston and Pritchard did not give him the competition that he needed to make him step.

The relay was a great race for two laps, but it also developed into a runaway.

Kelly, of course, had it all his own way in the hurdles and in the shot. There was not much class to any of the field events. The pole vault was tied up with several young men flopping over at the same height, but it was not real class.

NO COMPETITION.

The most noticeable thing about the meet was the lack of competition. I wonder if it ever occurred to the exponents of the freshman and one-year residence rules that men like Kelly and Drew and Annin are burning up years of their athletic lives. Kelly is in poor condition. He needs a rest, but yesterday he ran in two hurdle events, put the shot, did the broad jump and ran in the relay.

There are more than 100,000 college men in the United States, but only one Fred Kelly. There never was but one man who was in his class. That was Al Kraenzlein of the University of Pennsylvania.

When in the best of condition Kelly should not do more than the hurdles and a lap in the relay when his team is in a pinch. Putting the shot and broad jumping does not help him in hurdling, and it will tie him up.

The one-year residence rule is a poor one for Southern California. The California climate calls so many easterners to the Pacific Coast that many eastern college men would come out here with their parents if they were allowed to compete, and there would be more than one or two men in each college who had to do all the athletic work.
