# POMONA EASY FOR TROJANS.

*U.S.C. Men Outshine Rivals  
in Dual Meet.*

*Claremont Distance Men are  
Shining Stars.*

*Kelly and Drew Set Pace for  
Their Team-mates.*

All the dope was upset. The University of Southern California defeated Pomona by a score of 91 to 40 at track yesterday in a meet replete with surprises.

From the opening event to the relay, not once did Pomona have a chance to look dangerous. In the track events, U.S.C. scored forty points to thirty-seven racked up by the Claremont boys; but in the field numbers Glaze's men swept the deck. Out of the six events Pomona registered but three scattered points against fifty-one made by the Trojans.

## BRIGHT STARS.

Fred Kelly and Howard Drew gave U.S.C. almost as many points as Pomona's entire team was able to collect. Drew won the 100 and shared first honors with Bradley in the 220 out of kindness. He tied for first in the high jump, won the broad and ran a 51 1-5s. lap in the relay.

Kelly captured first in both hurdles and the shot, won third in the broad jump and 100-yard dash and ran a lap in the relay.

The close figuring of the U.S.C. coach and his athletes was not necessary. Pomona's team was not well balanced.

## SOME RACE.

The relay was the big race of the day and Glaze was as anxious to win this event as he was to carry off the meet. Tipton ran a spectacular race with G. Green in the quarter, losing by a narrow margin. Glaze decided to hold him out as relay insurance and give Pomona all three places in the 880. This move gave Pomona a clean count in the half, mile and two-mile events, without as much as a first-class speed brush.

Young started in the relay against Cogswell. The U.S.C. boy showed an excellent getaway and led Cogswell to the back stretch. Coming in at the finish the Pomona runner man-

aged to cut down the lead so that Kelly had but a yard on C. Green at the start of the second lap.

## NOT A CHANCE.

When the runners came through the gate, Green had Kelly by several feet. The Pomona supporters enjoyed one brief period of joy, but Kelly cut the session short. He rounded the turn ahead of Green and motioning for Drew to get over on the outside for the touch-off, gave the gifted sprinter two full yards on Powelson.

Drew ran like a frightened animal for the first 300 yards and stretched his lead to more than ten yards. Powelson put all he had into the race and managed to touch G. Green away about six yards behind Tipton.

At the 200 mark Green opened up. It looked as if he would overhaul his man. Foot by foot he crept up until he was on Tipton's heels; then the U.S.C. captain cut loose. He was just 150 yards from the finish. Green fell back, straining every muscle of his body in an effort to hold his own. Tipton, who was smarting under his defeat in the quarter, finished with speed in reserve and sprinted all the way to the dressing-room.

Bayley, Schultz and Ortleby started the counting in the first event, the

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hammer throw. Drew, Bradley and Kelly added another nine in the 100. Kelly stacked five on the pile in the high hurdles. Kelly and Clement added eight points in the shot and Drew, Cookman and Kelly captured all three places in the broad jump.

With a long lead on the score sheet, the sensational quarter did not do much harm when G. Green romped over ahead of Tipton with Young a close-up third.

Pomona's distance men then got busy and piled up eighteen points like an electric adding machine; but it was too late. Kelly had put another five-chip on the pile by his efforts in the low hurdles and Messrs. Bettinger and Cookman had staked Glaze to eight more with the bamboo pole.

## ALL TAKEN.

Clement and Elmore felt lucky and left but one point for Mr. Durkee when they finished exercising with the discus.

Drew had worked himself into a perspiration and he would not leave a stray point for Pomona. In the high and broad jumps, with the assistance of such athletes as Kelly, Bradley, Bettinger and Cookman, he took ten more points away from Pomona.

The 320-yard dash was yet to come. U.S.C. needed the points about as much as Henry Ford needs an automobile; but Drew loafed through, and with Bradley, finished ahead of little "Blondy" Given, Pomona's best actor in the speed scenes, who was glad to get a third.

There was no fast time made in any of the events. The track was slow and there was no competition except in the quarter and relay.
