CALIFORNIA DEFEATS ILLINOIS IN TRACK MEET.

BERKELEY (Cal.) April 3.—Weakness in the sprints and field events caused the defeat of the University of Illinois by the California varsity today by a score of 71 to 51.

Illinois captured first places in all the distance runs and in both hurdle races, but was unable to break into the five-spot class in the sprints. Stanton and Todd brought the fifteen points in the sprints to California, Stanton taking first in the hundred and 220 and Todd winning the quarter.

WEAK ON FIELD.

Field events proved Illinois's great stumbling block. She took no firsts, although Shoebinger tied for first honors with Gibbs in the pole vault. California made a clean sweep of the

high jump with the comparatively low height of 5ft. 10 $\frac{3}{4}$ in. The hammer throw brought "Illini" athletes but one point, but second place was won in the shot put and broad jump.

Drew again proved to be the feature of the day. He equalled the 120-yard-dash record made twenty-two years ago by Henderson, an Olympic Club sprinter, the time being 114-5s.

This is the Pacific Coast record, and has not been equalled since 1893. Incidentally, Drew was handicapped four yards against such men as Campbell, Murray and Nolin, and at the finish of the event of 100 yards led them by two full yards.

KELLY COMES BACK.

Despite the fact that Kelly had been reported as put out of condition, he gave no evidence of it in the

race he ran today. He covered the 120 low sticks in 15 1-5a., a fifth of a second slower than his world's record. Murray, Stanford's hurdler, pressed Kelly and not until the final sprint was the outcome certain.

Horine, in an exhibition match against Heeson, world's record holder in the high jump, defeated his old intercollegiate rival with a leap of 4ft. 3 1/2 in.

DISTANCER.

The middle eastern men proved their distance superiority beyond question. An indication of their ability at the long grind was given when Gantz took the pole in the mile race and serenely kept it for the whole race. Burgess, a Blue and Gold sophomore, earned his second in a terrific sprint for the tape that Wright could not find strength to combat. Considering track conditions the time is good.

GREAT MASON.

But it is to Mason, lean, stringy Illinois two miler, that the Blue and Gold is doffing its hat. He trotted to the tape at least an eighth of a mile in the lead of the rest of the pack. He runs as smoothly and as easily as a well-oiled machine, with even less friction. A couple of minutes after the race he was wandering around the track, apparently ready for another two miles at 8:00. If Mason had been pressed a new record might have resulted.

Tapping ran a heavy race in the 800. Miller of California attempted to lead out the Illinois man, while Cuendette laid low and conserved his strength. Tapping refused to sprint before the time. But when he did start his legs speeding in the last fifty yards he left Cuendette without trouble.

STANTON HERO.

Eddie Stanton was California's brightest star. He did not get his usual start in the 100-yard dash, but managed to arrive at the tape with the second man, Hammitt, three feet behind Arndt. The Bear second sprint man failed to place in this event, being entirely outclassed by the eastern runners.

When the 200 was announced the meet still hung in doubt. California led, but not enough to make the victory sure.

If Stanton could win first place in the dash the meet would be settled. The bleachers soon discovered the fact and yell leaders brought their batteries of forty-two-centimeter voices into action. After the starter's gun the cheers for the Los Angeles runner rattled back to the hills and when he broke the tape the die did great credit to the carefully-trained vocal athletes.

California was disappointed in the hurdle results. Preble, after his performance against U.S.C., was expected to land in first money. As it was he had a hard fight to take second from Ames, the Illinois hurdler. Knapp made a pretty race in the low hurdles, but Ames landed first by several feet.

California in the relay held the early lead gained by Bradway and at no time were these five points endangered.

Five thousand spectators saw the meet and dedication exercises. Illinois alumni were out in force with an organized rooting section.

President Wheeler and various regents made speeches and the \$80,000 athletic field was formally dedicated as "California oval."
