CLAREMONT, May 8.—It was all Pomona. The conference track engagement ended with the Blue and White out in front with a score of 53½ and Occidental beating U.S.C. out for second place with a count of 26½ to 26. Whittier was fourth with 21½ chips, and Redlands brought up in the rear with 8 slinkers.

The funny work started in the first event. Mr. John Junior Elmore of U.S.C. stepped into the ring and kidded himself into heaving the hammer out 125ft. 11in., which distance was good for first place. Schultz of U.S.C. stepped into second honors and Mr. Courtenay Stuyvesant Overin won a single point for Pomona with his efforts.

ANNIN BEATEN.

There was another surprise doled out in the mile. Mr. Walter Sturges ran away from William Annin of Occidental, taking the event at the rate of 4m. 31 1-5s. Capt. Rollin Jerome Lafollette of the Hun gang, romped across the finish line in third position with a lot of stuff left for future reference.

Whittier was ably represented by the twin brothers Murray, Earl and Verl, and by Mr. Walter Cammack. V. Murray won the 220-yard low hurdles, tying the record of 24 4-5s. made by Fred Thompson of Occidental five years ago. This Murray person also took second in the broad jump and won the high hurdles in 15 3-5s. E. Murray ran a fast race in the quarter, but finished just outside the money. The twins finished the day's labor by contributing to the attractiveness of the relay.

TWO HEATS.

There were two heats to the 100-yard dash and when the finals were announced, Mr. Wilbur Farrel Bradley was the first man mentioned. His time was 10 3-5s. Mr. Allison Bruce Given of Pomona won second honors and that Cammack boy of Whittier was third under. In the 220 number, young Cammack showed up first for the timers to work on, Mr. Given taking the next best stateroom. Poor little Bradley was out of luck throughout the ramble, being un-

able to get his striders to working properly. He finished in third place, hitting on about three cylinders.

SURPRISE.

A pleasant surprise was pulled for the Pomona rooters in the shot-put number. Messrs. Jonathan Baker Durkee and William Guggenheim Metz, claimed out into the suburbs with the lead ball, winning first and second and leaving Clement of U.S.C. trying to figure it out at the post.

Mr. Bohn Michel Coffeen of Occidental increased the popularity of broad jumping by five points and tied for first in the pole handling with Messrs. Bettenger and McLain of U.S.C. and Occidental, respectively.

In the high jump, Powell of Redlands stepped to the front and grabbed off the gold medal. Robbins of Whittier, Krause of Pomona and Hibbard of Occidental all jammed up for what was left in the way of points.

Mr. Frank Marion Watenpaugh of Pomona, one of the promising young gentlemen in the event, was disqualified by a squad of judges who failed to appreciate the advantages of his jumping form.

There was really nothing wrong with the system worked out by Mr. Watenpaugh and it made a difference of only two or three feet, but the judges would not let him hold the bar down with one hand as he went over and he was told that the place to compete in the fence-vaulting contest was in an indoor meet.

Charles Nathan Green was disqualified in the high hurdles also, but it made no difference as far as the score sheet was concerned, as Mr. Paul Rodney Daggs and a Mr. Heath took all the places left on the sheet as it was.

THE 440.

The quarter was a great race to

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watch and brought out the best in Messrs. George William Green, Cook and Wells. Capt. Cyrus Noble Tipton of U.S.C. was not among the brethren when the big start came off. Tipton showed up as the best custodian of infirmities on the track, and finished in a bunch of concentrated agony, several yards behind the last man.

At that Tipton says that he has a lot of stuff left that he will dispense for the interest of the intercollegiate public at the A.A.U. meet, as he is going to train for about two days some time next week if he don't forget about it.

Capt. La Follette was the victor in the half-mile at 2 3-5. Walt Sturges bounded into second honors in the last 100 yards of the race and Annin of Occidental was shoved back into third position.

THE TWO-MILE.

The two-mile event was a long-drawn-out affair, with little class except for the work of Mr. David Daniel Sturges. This member of the Sturges family lapped the other contestants and finished in 10m. 6 1-5s., while there were a number of other two-mile votaries struggling for the "leav-in's." Ford of Redlands, and Huddleston of Occidental finally finished in one and two order, with the fight for second place standing out as one of the features of the entire meet.

Honors in the relay also went to Pomona. Occidental took second and Whittier a close third, with Tipton of U.S.C. struggling across the line a weak last. The Murrays of Whittier started out like a bunch of race horses, but Pomona had the old stuff and Whittier's relay hopes died early.
