

TROJANS SMEAR BEAR FRESHMEN.

BASEBALL GAME A WALKAWAY FOR THE LAW SCHOOL.

Tennis Squad of the Southern California School Ties Bear Varsity and Then the Track Team Wipes the Earth with the Bear Freshmen.

BERKELEY, March 25.—After a thirty-two hour boat ride from Los Angeles, which ended late last evening, the U.S.C. athletes spent today in pleasant diversions on the California campus. Though many of the Trojans averred that their digestive apparatuses were disordered, few of them gave evidence of weakness in any way.

The U.S.C. squad began its recreations by scaring the freshman baseball team into a 15 to 3 defeat, then the tennis players, cheered by the news, proceeded to tie the varsity while the track team submerged the freshmen by a 75 to 44 score.

The big event of the day was the track meet, granted to the Trojans from the start. The score is about what was expected, but the meet except in a few spots was dreary. The freshmen did nothing unusual, and neither did U.S.C., but some of the races held all the thrill that an intercollegiate contest could have had.

Thomson took both hurdle races, bringing a surprise to the freshmen who counted on Grunsky taking the low sticks. In neither of the races was Thomson in serious danger of losing his five points. He took the lead at the third barrier in the high hurdles, while Grunsky and Gansner fought for second. Grunsky gained in the sprint for the tape and took second. The low hurdles, fondly hoped to be Grunsky's race, did not turn out that way. Thomson took an easy lead, winning by three yards. Gansner caught his spike on a hurdle at half way, fell, and was out of the race. He led Grunsky at the time.

The 100-yard dash was an unfortunate race for U.S.C. Murray, football quarter and sprinter, tore a ligament in his left leg. Volz reports that he will be out of the game for the season. Flynn forced Bradley in this race, beyond the expectations of the fans, who after twenty yards of the race expected Mosley to make second place. Mosley lost his chance in the last thirty yards, as Flynn forged his way to Bradley's heels.

The sprint between George and Blanchard in the half-mile provided the thrill for the bleachers. Blanchard, a long-legged freshman, clung to the pole until the straightaway, apparently still strong after his continuous pacing. But George, who saved himself, made up the distance and breasted the tape not more than three inches ahead of the freshman. It was the sensation of the day.

Miller and Crippen entangled themselves with the officials to their own disadvantage in the mile run. The freshman field was hopeless. Crippen had carried the U.S.C. colors in the van for three laps, then becoming chivalrous decided to make a dead race of it by waiting for Miller. Miller hove in sight after while and the two trotted to the tape. But this performance didn't appeal to the judges, who announced Miller as winner as a warning and penalty to Crippen. Premeditated dead heats receive little encouragement in the north.

Watson, the sole entry for the south in the two-mile, lapped one freshman and puffed to the tape twenty-five yards to the good. The time was slow and the race without feature.

The relay was won for U.S.C. by Wilcox, the first man to start. The good yards that he gained were increased until the last lap when the freshman runner gave Martin a hopeless chase. Though the distance was lessened, Martin still had twenty-five yards to spare at the finish.
