

# MERCURYMEN ARE RUINED.

**Trojans Walk All Over Them  
in Speedy Track Meet.**

**Fred Kelly and Bean do the  
Club's Scoring.**

**Ed Stanton Blows Cylinder in  
Hundred-yard Dash.**

The Los Angeles Athletic Club track team went down to a glorious defeat on Harvard Field yesterday afternoon. Coach Dean Crosswell's well-scourished athletes were a little too nimble for the Mercury-men and managed to win the affair easily.

Briefly, the results are these: University of Southern California, 184; Los Angeles Athletic Club, 15.

## MINUS QUANTITY.

From the colors of the suits of the athletes one would think that University of Southern California was running a brisk practice. The blue and white uniforms were so few and far between that they couldn't be seen by the naked eye. In fact, there were only five or six of them on the whole field.

But what the club lacked in numbers it attempted to make up in class. The dashes, hurdles, and shot were used for by Fred Kelly, Clarence Bean managed the pole vault, high jump and broad jump; Mickey McClure did the honors in the 440-yard dash, while Oil and Zelle both came home with a point for the Los Angeles Athletic Club.

"Class rather than quality," appears to be the new slogan of the Seventh-street institution. But it didn't pay them much yesterday. U.S.C.'s abundance of talent turned the trick.

## HURDLES

In the 110-yard dash H. Lampert displayed a thorough knowledge of the sport and defeated such notables as Kelly, Johnson and Ed Hunter. The latter gent was attempting to stage a comeback in this meet. He started out on the dash like a wild man, but blew a cylinder in the early stages of the game. Ed Stanton hasn't had a foot in a track shoe for over two years and a come-back under these circumstances is hardly done in the best circles.

Becke was predicted to win the half mile and did. He had a difficult line, however, and was closely pressed by George and Wilson to the finish. But a neat sprint at the very last put him in the lead.

It will have to be handed to Fred Kelly. He stepped out on the course without any practice and ran the high sticks in 15 1-2 seconds. Gannor ran a great race but was never within dangerous distance of Kelly. Chasent showed form in third place.

## REAL RACE.

The mile was one of the real races of the day. Miller was the lengthier distance by sprinting around the field for six laps. He is a short guy and the only way he has of getting anywhere is to run with all his might. He ran just as fast as he could for five laps and then speeded a little on the final circuit.

In taking this event he passed up both Doc Cook and Crippen, who crossed the tape together.

Mickey McClure, another ancient specimen of the track, came out yesterday and turned a fast 440 right on the heels of Wilson, the Trojan demon quarter-mile. Mickey showed all the pep in the world and very nearly ruined Wilson when he sprinted up even with him on the home stretch. Mickey's many friends congratulated him on his remarkable showing and feel sure that a little training would put him up along with the top notchers.

Clarence Bean had an easy time in the pole vault and hoisted the bar to twelve feet before he gave up the ghost. Maurer of U.S.C. kept right in the running but couldn't quite hit the dozen.

The relay was forfeited to U.S.C. by the club because of lack of proper talent. However, the Trojans hatched up a couple of teams among themselves and pulled off a pretty fair exhibition just for the fun of it.
