

# U.S.C. VARSITY TRACK MEN DOWN POLYTECHNIC.

**D**OING the expected, but more than they were expected to do, the varsity track team of U.S.C., had a little practice yesterday at Bovard field, with the Poly High team, beating them, 79 to 43. The Trojan warriors took every first place, except the 100-yard dash and the 220, which were won by Schiller of Poly, the only Mechanic who could master Dean Cromwell's fast athletes.

In the events that take strength and power, Poly never had a chance. They beat the U.S.C. freshmen but could not make any kind of a showing with the varsity squad. In the discus throw, Blakeslee of U.S.C., threw the round platter 101 ft., 5 in. Hartman, of Poly, finished second, but was way behind the winning throw.

The sprints were the events that opened the eyes of the fans. Schiller took the 100-yard dash in 10 3-5 s., with Jones of Poly fast upon his footsteps. He also won the 220 in great style, making the trip in 23 1-5 s. The distance runs went for U.S.C., George, the long-winded Trojan, took both the half-mile and the mile runs, finishing in good time.

Coach Skinner's men put up a good fight but the odds were against them. U.S.C. has men that are experienced, their team should be a winner this year, but much credit must be given the Poly heroes for the good fighting spirit they display. If the meet was between L. A. and Poly the results might have been different, but these two prep teams will fight it out the later part of next week.
