

TROJANS BOW TO BEARS ON TRACK

Unusually Fast Times Made in Sprint Events.

Charlie Paddock Takes Hundred and Two-Twenty.

California has Easy Picking in Field Numbers.

Running true to form Coach Walter Christie's University of California track team defeated U.S.C. 75½ to 45½ in a meet featured by exceptionally fast time in the sprints.

Charley Paddock of U.S.C. stepped the 100-yard dash in 10s. flat and ran the fastest 220 ever contested on the Trojan oval. His time in this race was 22s. flat, unusual for the difficult Bovard field curves.

RAH FOR SCHILLER!

George Schiller, also of U.S.C., covered himself with glory when he devoured the 440 in the wonderful time of 49 4-5s. Capt. Gwynn Wilson of U.S.C. surprised the Blue and Gold adherents when he slipped past Hendrixon, the best of the Rear quarter-milers, on the straight-away. He finished one yard and a half behind Schiller.

U.S.C. depended on the efforts of four men—Paddock, Schiller, Wilson and Evans—for the majority of her points. The quartette won 36, 9¼ shy of the combined total of the squad.

NOT A CHANCE.

In six events—the mile, high hurdles, pole vault, high jump, broad jump and low hurdles—the Blue and Gold took first and second places. Thereby hangs the tale of the Trojan defeat—32 to 6.

U.S.C., to furnish better competition for California, used two of her freshman team men in Marvin, the two-miler, and Leadingham, the pole vaulter. The former led the field to the tape in 10m., 11s. and Leadingham tied with Graham and Peterson of California in the pole vault at 11ft., 6in. The points of these men did not count.

WALTZ SLIPS.

Wilson of U.S.C. defeated Waltz of California by two yards in the 880 in 2m., 2s.

Roy Evans won both the discus and shot put for U.S.C., and took practically the only points registered by U.S.C. in the field events. His winning toss in the shot was 40ft., 9¼in. and in the discus 125 ft., 7¼in.

There was nothing startling about the California victory. The Bears had the better all-around team, and they went out and won as they pleased. U.S.C. had the individual stars, but California had the team.

Dean Cromwell's pessimism was pretty well vindicated as a whole. The U.S.C. coach had predicted defeat for his team, estimating that

his athletes would accumulate in the neighborhood of 35 points. The first place in the shot put secured by "Swede" Evans, the boy wonder and "Shorty" Miller's second in the two-mile accounted for the unexpected points that swelled the Trojan total.

"Peaky" Sprott of California ran a beautiful race in the mile. H. Let Mejia, his team-mate, set the pace for three-fourths of the way when he uncorked an easy sprint that landed him first fifteen yards from the good in 4m. 37s.

NO COMPETITION.

The Bear hurdlers had no com

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petition at all, and loafed in. Henderson winning the high in 15 4-5s., and Grunsky the low in 26s. flat. Willit, the lone Trojan entry in the former event, threw a shoe on the third hurdle and ran out of his lane, being disqualified.

The relay race was the big surprise of the day for the dopesters and U.S.C. rooters. The Blue and Gold four-man outfit had been defeated up North by the combined Redlands-Pomona team in 3m. 31s., but foxy Walter Christie switched the combination on U.S.C., and the Trojans were defeated in 3m. 28 1-5s. The same U.S.C. men that ran yesterday had won the race at the A.A.U. relay carnival in 3m. 27 2-5s., and they were expected to repeat.

Henderson assumed the lead on the first lap for California and finished three yards ahead of Wilcox of U.S.C. Isenhouer held his own with McKenzie of California, but Wilson of U.S.C. lost about five yards receiving the baton from Isenhouer. Schiller got the stick from Wilson about ten yards behind Sprott of California. It was a hopeless task to catch the smooth running Sprott. Schiller had just finished a fast 220 and was all in.
