

# TROJANS BOW TO STANFORD

## U.S.C. Puts up Fierce Battle Against Visitors.

### Is in the Lead Over Half of the Afternoon.

#### Charley Paddock Hangs it on Superman Kirksey.

Stanford defeated U.S.C., 61 to 52, in their annual track meet yesterday by hogging practically all the second places on the programme. To be exact, the Cardinal athletes grabbed ten seconds, five firsts and six thirds to U.S.C.'s two seconds, eight firsts and six thirds.

The Trojan rooters were inclined to chortle considerably over the close finish of the meet. They had fully expected as decisive a trimming as California handed out the week previous. Only the absence of a chap the type of Fred Kelly prevented the local product from winning the affair. With the "King" in the line-up, U.S.C. wouldn't have dropped sixteen points in the barrier events.

#### WERE IN LEAD.

For over half of the afternoon the Trojans were in the lead. At the conclusion of the 880-yard run, won by Wilson of U.S.C. after a grand sprint on the back stretch, Dean Cromwell's men were romping in front, 33 to 30. At this juncture Stanford, more particularly Templeton, Green and Weaver, gave the score an awful belt in the slats by snagging all the points in the high jump. Eight more markers, turned in by Wells and Davis in the low hurdles, put the northerners away out in front, and they were never headed.

Superman Kirksey of Stanford wasn't suping and Charley Paddock scattered his remains carelessly over Harvard Field in both the 100-yard and 220-yard dashes. Both races were run in even time—10s. and 22s. The Cardinal was beaten by a yard in the shorter dash and ten yards in the furlong.

#### FELT IT COMING.

Kirksey was heard to remark after the finish of the hundred if he couldn't beat Paddock there it was a cinch he didn't have a chance in the 220. We can say for Mr. Kirksey that his judgment is remarkably accurate.

The time in the sprints was exceptionally good, considering the soggy condition of the track and the stiff wind that blew in the runners' faces.

Noel George of U.S.C. sprung a bit of a surprise in the mile, the first event, by leading Kaskell of Stanford to the tape by a stride in 4m. 41 4-5s. Shorty Miller earned undying fame by urging his sawed off legs around the oval for a U.S.C. third. Westwick of Stanford, ill with the flu recently, was crowded out of the money. He is capable of much better time.
