

TROJANS TAKE TRACK HONORS.

Win A.A.U. Championships with Lengthy Score.

Sage Hen Athletes Come in for Second Place.

M. Cook, Unattached, Snags of a Lone Point.

Nothing but a heavy track prevented Charley Paddock of U.B.C. from at least equalling a couple of world's records in the A.A.U. meet at Claremont yesterday. The wonderful Trojan sprinter snipped off the 100-yard dash in 17 1/2, and the 220 in 32 3/4, 1/2, one of the records in each instance. Two of the five timers caught him in 17 1/2 in the shorter race and two registered 32 1/2 in the furlong.

Considering the lousy condition of the Pomona straitjacket the time in both dashes was nothing short of marvelous. Thursday night's rain had thoroughly soaked the ground, and it was only at a late hour Friday night that Coach Nixon of Pomona decided to go ahead with arrangements for holding the meet.

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Dean Crowwell's U.B.C. hopes had no difficulty in sweeping away with the frolic, accumulating 87 points to the 26 of Pomona, their nearest rival. Redlands was a bit of a disappointment. Wild Bill Young was frustrating below par, and the Pomona had to be satisfied with 12 markers.

Kilby of Redlands, expected to come to take the measure of Schlyap of U.B.C. in the 440, was hardly a factor in the race. He blew an offer to carry the first 111 far ahead of the field, and was ousted by Schlyap, Wilson and Swartzel, the latter of Santa Ana High, in the order named. Schlyap had about four yards on Wilson at the time, and Swartzel was right behind him. The time was 1:13 1/2.

Kilby also relieved himself by executing the last leg of the relay in 1:06 1/2, enabling Redlands to win this in the exceptionally fast time of 5:01 1/2.

High school athletes came in for more than honorable mention when Charley of Chaffee High nabbed the high jump at 6ft. 11in. with Arroyo of Concord, second form and all right behind at 6ft. 11in., Jacobus of Chaffee, the pole at 11ft. 8in. and Nichols of Pomona High, the low, atop and jump at 4ft. 9 1/2in.

One of the big features of the day was Verl Merritt's remarkable race in the 220-yard low steeple. The former Whittier man now does his practicing over a lone hurdle which he plants in the one pasture of his farm, but disregarding all such disadvantages he faded both Dorcas of Pomona and Bill Young of Redlands in 24 1/2. He was inches behind Young in the high barriers in 15 1/2.

U.B.C. sprinters glowered most of the day in the sprints, Paddock and Tenchener finishing one, two in the 100, and Paddock, Tenchener and Wright as named in the 220. Charley won the first race by three yards and the second by twenty.

Johnny Beale, freshman of U.B.C., started the big campaign of home protest by snatching first in the discus throw with a disk of 126ft. 7in. William of Pomona was second with 127ft. 1in., and Fred Houser of Concord, third, at 124ft. 4in.
