

Trojans Beat World-Record Time; Lincoln High, Redlands and Compton-Go Ahead.

It would take a mighty careful picker to name the individual or team hero of the A.A.U. Relay Carnival at Pasadena yesterday. Half a dozen teams and about as many individuals stood out prominently and numerous events were contested bitterly. The time made, despite the fact that the rain had left the track a trifle soggy, was excellent.

Dean Cromwell's personally conducted track squad from U.S.C. hogged the honors in the open events with a total of 24 points. Occidental was second with 15, Pomona third with 12, Redlands fourth with 4, the L.A.A.C. fifth with 3, Los Angeles High, Pomona High and Lincoln High next with 2 each and California Tech last with a single digit gained by Crissman in the 100-yard dash.

IT WAS EXPECTED.

Lincoln High took Class 1 high school honors, as expected, with a handsome total of 18 points. Other scores were Hollywood 10; Los Angeles 6, Pasadena 5, Manual Arts 3, Polytechnic 1.

In Class 2 the Redlands aggregation was given a terrible run for its money by Santa Monica, the Beachcombers amassing 11 points to 12 for Redlands. San Bernardino got 4 points and Santa Ana 3 more.

Thanks to Mr. Blenkron who did the same thing for Compton that Bob Allen did for Redlands, Compton spreadeagled the field in Class 3 with 15 points. La Verne got 6, Huntington Beach 4, Chino 3, Harvard 2 and Covina, Claremont and Bonita 1 each.

BITTER CONTEST.

Of the special events the pole vault was undoubtedly the most spectacular and bitterly contested and the stick climbing was unusually good. Three men, Goodenough of Occidental, Dennis of L. A. High School and Emmons of U.S.C. succeeded in clearing the 12-ft. mark and there they stuck. After much trying to get over the bar at 12 ft. 2 in., Goodenough was announced as winner, Dennis second and Emmons third.

Charles Paddock eloped with the open 100-yard dash, running his heat and the final, likewise, in 9 4-16. Bill Isenhour and George Schiller also of U.S.C. crossed the line about four yards back. How the judges succeeded in picking the second and third place men nobody knows as Isenhour, Schiller, Crissman of Tech, Argue of Oxy and Arnold of Pomona, all roared across the tape within inches of each other.

QUITE A STRUGGLE.

The open high jump was more or less of a struggle between Corey of the L.A.A.C., Argue of Occidental, and Sencerbox and Fisher of Lincoln High, who finished in that order. Corey soared over the bar at 5ft. 10in. In the 120-yard hurdles Bill Yount and Feg Murray didn't compete and Charley Daggs of Pomona College, and Otto Anderson of Pomona High, had a duel for honors, finishing in the order named in the excellent time of 15 3-5. Haab and Lewis of U.S.C. added to the total of their Alma Mater by grabbing third and fourth.

Redlands and Pomona each did exactly what they planned to do—grab off their special event. U.S.C. did the same thing, while the Occidental Tigers made most of their points by taking seconds and thirds.

The record-holding Baptist quartet in the one-mile, four-man event carefully stayed out of all the special races and justified its actions by winning in handsome style. Lloyd Yount, running first, built up a good lead on Powers of Occidental, and Purcell of U.S.C., who finished about five yards to the bad.

HOLDS THE LEAD.

Zediker of Redlands took up the running and held his lead nicely, although Baker of Occidental pressed him hard, particularly at the start of the race. Bill Yount took up the running and tore off a wild

third lap, gaining about five yards on Martin of Occidental. Gwynn Wilson of U.S.C. came from the rear with a rush and sent Schiller of U.S.C. off about three yards back of Spangler of Occidental, who was ten yards back of Kilby of Redlands.

Bill Yount beat Spangler out of whatever chance he had to be a big hero by collapsing flat on the track and as Spangler received the baton from Martin he stumbled over the prostrate Redlands runner and fell clear out into the crowd. He was yanked to his feet by the crowd and gamely took up the running three yards back of Schiller. Neither man was able to gain a step on the other, and for that matter, neither of them was able to gain much more than a step on Kilby. The Redlands time was 3m. 29 3/4s.

WILD AGGREGATION.

A wild aggregation of young men got off in the start of the open eight-man one-mile relay and U.S.C. got the pole and kept it, Paddock finishing twenty yards ahead of Spangler of Occidental. The U.S.C. time of 3m. 6s. was announced as a new world's record and certainly the race was only of the most spectacular in the history of Southern California relays. The Trojans ran consistently good laps and Paddock probably could have made the time even faster if he had been pushed.

Now that we think of it, Ray Moreman probably deserves the marble cake of soap for the best individual performance of the day. He lit out at the start of the four-man, two mile relay and simply ran away from the field, finishing his half-mile in 2m. 9/16s., the fastest half of the year and likewise the biggest surprise of the season. Moreman has always been a two-miler until now and incidentally was supposed to have been ill. Gosh! Pomona's lead was never touched and Redlands, Occidental and U.S.C. were pretty well strung out at the finish.

Blenkron of Compton and Allen of Redlands won the honors for their schools in their particular classes. Each man won the 100-yard dash in his class, Blenkron in the sensational time of 10 flat and they each set their particular team off to good advantage. Stapler and Norman, Lincoln's two colored sprinters, did the same thing for their institution. The results:
