

BEARS GO FAST IN MUD.

Defeat Trojans by Gorgeous Score on a Damp Track; Paddock a Wonder.

Grabbing first places in all but three events without any apparent effort in most of them, the University of California varsity track team yesterday defeated the University of Southern California on Bovard Field by the gorgeous score of 38½ to 41½.

Despite the waterlogged condition of the track, particularly at the pole, fast time was made in the events in which the competition was warmest. Charley Paddock in particular showed that he is a mudlark by roaring through both sprint events in splendid time, his 9 4-5 in the 100-yard dash being nothing short of remarkable. Not only was the track bad, but he was running into a breeze.

HE WAS FORCED.

The Trojan sprinter was forced to keep moving by a red-headed, freckle-faced young man named Hutchinson of California, who took second in both dashes, being par-

ticularly close in the century. Paddock got away fast in both races and won the century by about two yards and the furlong by twice that much. Paddock's time of 22 flat around the hairpin turn of Bovard Field is quite as good as his performance in the century.

As was expected, the quarter-mile race proved to be a thriller and this time Oxy Hendrixon of California got his revenge on Schiller and Wilson of U.S.C. The track was so bad at the pole that for at least half its length it was impossible for the runners to get any closer than the second lane and in some places the third. Schiller and Saxby, the California second string quarter-miler, had a terrible race for the pole at the start, the Californian finally taking it from the Trojan.

A THRILLER.

As they passed the stands Schiller pulled up past Saxby and Gwynn Wilson came up even with Hendrixon, who was running a nice third. On the lower turn, Hendrixon began to pull up and passed both Saxby and Schiller. Down the long stretch Hendrixon's strength told and he finished two yards to the good. The time of 50 3-5s. was splendid as Hendrixon undoubtedly ran six or eight yards more than the regulation distance because of the condition of the track. On a good track the race would have been well under 50 seconds.

Tommy Lewis of U.S.C. was the surprise package of the day with second places in both hurdle events. In both stick climbing contests he led until the last hurdle only to be nosed out by Henry of California.

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Raab was a sort of an all-round performer for U.S.C., taking second in the pole and third in the high hurdles and javelin.

RAH FOR BRICK.

Brick Muller was just about as pestiferous as usual, winning the high jump and the broad jump for the Bears, not to mention taking a second in the javelin and a third in the discus. This made him the high point man of the day. Johnny Boyle took the only first place for U.S.C. that Paddock didn't nail by sailing the discuss 134ft. 7in. He and Swede Evans were far too good at heaving the wooden biscuit for the invaders.

The one-mile relay was rather expected to be a great race, but the absence of Bill Isenhour hurt the Trojans and cut out their only chance of doing anything. Wesley Kitts, former Hollywood boy, ran the first lap for the Bears, having warmed up for it by grabbing second place in the two-mile, and opened up a lead of about ten yards on Wright of U.S.C. Saxby of California made the lead twenty yards on Eddle Leahy, McDonald of California and Hendrixon held the lead nicely despite the desperate efforts

of Gwynn Wilson and George Schiller to make up the deficit.

DISAPPOINTING.

The Trojans were so weak in the distances and field events that the competition in these races was very disappointing. Emmons and Chapman were missing from the pole vault, Emmons from the high jump, Rogers from the low hurdles and broad jump and Isenhour from the sprints and relay. Some of these young men had pulled tendons in their legs while others had the same difficulty above the ears. The summary:
