

# CARDINALS WIN IN CLOSE MEET.

## Take Fighting Trojans Down and Line 71 to 60.

## Snif Head Wind Slows Athletes in the Races.

## Grand Stands on Fire; Discus Threatens Press Box.

With a large and dusty wind howling through the athletes' E.V.D.'s and the cash customers' overcoats, the Stanford track team hooked up with U.S.C. yesterday afternoon on Hayward Field and won by a 71-to-60 vote. In addition to gorgeous competition in most of the events, the grand stands caught on fire and Morris Kirksey heaved the discus into the press box.

### NO DAMAGE DONE.

The fire in the grand stands was quickly subdued by Graduate Manager Henry Bruce, who rushed over with two large bucketsful of water and dampened the whole proceedings. As the press box was packed with the people who usually pack press boxes, no newspaper man's lives were threatened as the discus flew over in that direction. When Kirksey heaves the discus he stands with his back to the spot where he hopes the discus will eventually land, but sometimes it doesn't. Yesterday he gave it a powerful ride and sent the thing almost to the grand stands. It hit a rail of the press box, however, and bounced out without doing any harm. But it was a miracle and almost a pity that several persons in this popular string of seats weren't killed.

After this when Mr. Kirksey is throwing the discus the customers will all be permitted to use the windows in U.S.C.'s Hall of Letters, watching the event from there is comparative safety.

### NOT A SLAUGHTER.

While Stanford succeeded in winning the track meet it wasn't a slaughter by a long shot. Paddock opened the excitement by heaving Kirksey badly in the lurch in the 100-yard dash. Kirksey missed his stride at about the 70-yard mark and Paddock hit the tape easily a yard to the good. The time of 18.84 is remarkable because the athletes ran head-on into a stiff breeze.

In the 200-yard dash Kirksey of Stanford didn't enter and the Trojans carried off all three places with Paddock well in the lead.

One of the best races of the day was the 100-yard high hurdles. Wells of Stanford got off to a fair lead, but was pressed most of the way by his team-mate, Williams, and Lewis of U.S.C. These two men ran almost neck and neck. Wells hit the tape first, with Williams inches ahead of Lewis. But it was found that out of a possible ten hurdles Wells had latted almost 100 per cent and he was disqualified for knocking down too many of 'em. This gave Williams first and the Trojans Lewis and Noah, second and third.

### HAD EVERYTHING.

In the distance events Stanford had everything, clearing up completely in the two-mile and taking the best two places in the mile. In the two-mile Edleman and Rowanet of Stanford both lapped the Trojans' best bet, discouraging the latter young man so badly that he gave up the ghost one circuit before the finish. Elliott of Stanford piled up a noble aggregation of points by winning both the mile and the half.

The relay belonged to the Trojans from the start. Lambour started first and made several yards on Forster of Stanford. Leahy increased the lead slightly. In the third stanza Wright picked up a little on Wilson, but even at that it was soft sailing and Schiller loafed around on the final lap.

### RAH FOR EVANS!

Evans was the individual star of the field events winning both the shot and the discus. Stanford hogged everything in the high jump and split nine points three ways. Delphay of U.S.C. did the most damage in the broad jump with a powerful stage of 279.7 1/2 in.

With a steady wind blowing up the course the times in the various races look decidedly good.
