

# WORLD RECORDS DIP AS PADDOCK SMASHES TAPE

## Marvelous Time Made by Local Runner in the Sprints; Bears Simply Ruin the Trojans, at That.

BERKELEY, March 26.—Better time than the world record of 21 1-5s. in the 220-yard run was made by Charles W. Paddock, University of Southern California's crack sprinter, running against the University of California here today. The five judges credited him with the time of 20 4-5s., three watches having caught him at that mark, while two others shaded toward 20 3-5s.

### HE'S SOME RUNNER.

Paddock, who won the 100-meter run at the Olympic Games last year, held the 1920 Amateur Athletic Union championship in the 220-yard event for 1920, having won the title at the Harvard stadium July 17, 1920, in 21 2-5s.

In addition to bettering the world 220-yard mark Paddock today also tied the world record of 9 3-5s in the 100-yard run. Although the southern champion was in excellent form his team could not win the meet and California won 105 points to 36. The University of Southern California was not entered in the high jump, the mile and the two-mile run.

Because there was a slight breeze blowing during the meet, track officials doubted if Paddock's record would be allowed by the Amateur Athletic Union. Every effort will be made, however, to have it allowed. Starters said they held the 220-yard run until there was a lull in the wind and the judges said they believed Paddock was not helped by wind.

"I see no valid reason why the mark should not be allowed," Sydney A. Tibbetts, San Francisco,

referee of the meet, said. "The timing was done by five experienced judges, the watches were inspected and all agreed that Paddock made 20 4-5s. or better." First, it was said four watches caught him at 20 4-5s. and one at 20 3-5s. Later after a magnifying glass was put on the time pieces, it was announced two shaded toward the three-fifths mark.

Outside of the races in which Paddock was entered and the discus throw, the California athletes took every first place, bettering their mark of March 14, when they defeated U.S.C. at Los Angeles, 88 1/2 to 41 1/2.
