

TROJANS CAPTURE FIRST HONORS IN RELAY MEET

Many Marks, Including One World Record, Go by the Board; Oxy Finishes Second

The greatest relay meet in the history of Southern California developed into more or less of a landslide for U.S.C. yesterday. One world's record, two Pacific Coast records, one new Southern California mark and two new relay meet records were hung up during the course of the afternoon, the weather conditions being absolutely perfect while the fast Occidental track was in the best shape of its honorable career.

Dean Cromwell's sterling athletes hung up a new world mark in the eight-man one-mile relay, covering the distance in 3m. 58.2-5a. The Trojans then beat their own Pacific Coast four-man one-mile record by circling the oval four times in 3m. 21.2-3a. Occidental got away with a Coast record of twelve years standing by winning the four-man two-mile event in 8m. 14.4-5a. Pomona set a four-man four-mile mark of 18m. 57.1-5a. Otto Anderson set the relay meet broad jump record at 23ft. 11in. and Charley Lewis of the L.A.A.C. set a relay meet pole vault mark of 12ft. 5.7-8 in.

TROJANS NOT PRESSED

Final scores in the open events were: U.S.C., 40; Occidental, 17; Pomona, 16; L.A.A.C., 10; S.B.U.C., 3; Caltech, 2. San Diego, 2; Huntington Beach, 1/2; Hollywood, 1/2. In class 1 high schools, Pasadena won with 14 points; L. A. High, 8; Long Beach, 5; Poly, 5; Jefferson, 3; Lincoln, 2 and Manual 1. In Class 2, high schools, San Bernardino won with 7 points; Santa Ana, 6; Chaffey, 5; Fullerton, 5; Santa Monica, 4; Riverside, 3, and Redlands, 3. In Class 3, high schools Franklin led with 7 points. El Monte, 4; San Fernando, 5; Huntington Beach, 4; Owensmouth, 3; Huntington Park, 3; Norwalk, 3; Compton, 2.

The world's record set by the Trojan sprinters was sensational in the extreme, although the U.S.C. runners were not pressed. Otto Anderson, whose leg was too sore to hurdle, but not too sore to set a new broad jump record, started things off with a lap in 22 seconds flat, nosing out Powers of Occidental by about two yards. From that time on there was no question as to the ultimate winner. Starry, Lowe, Hughes, Shaw, Johnson, Martz and Paddock building up an increasing lead on every lap. Pomona sprang a surprise party by beating Occidental.

OXY SETS COAST MARK

The Trojan four-man record was the result of some wonderful running. Hughes, running first for U.S.C., was beaten by Ellsworth of Occidental, but Johnson sent Ed Shaw off with a good lead over Cliff Argue, who was pinch-hitting for Tony Spaugler's pulled tendon, and Shaw's rapid lap was built into a long lead by Yale Martz, running the final lap. Occidental was second about thirty yards back and Pomona was twenty yards back of Occidental. The Trojans averaged less than 50 2-5 seconds per lap. The former record of 3m. 27a. was held by Leahy, Isenhour, Wilson and Schiller of U.S.C. and was made two years ago.

Occidental set a four-man Pacific Coast record in the two-mile relay when Giffen, Moyer, Carter and Ellsworth won by forty yards in the sensational time of 8m. 10 4-5a., an average of better than 2.02 4-5 seconds per man. Caltech sprang a big surprise by leading on the first lap and U.S.C. sprang an equally big surprise by taking second place over the Engineers, while Pomona, favorite, was unplaced, partly due to a fumbled baton. The former record was made by Cole, Torrance, Smith and Hall of U.S.C. in 1911.

Pomona's four-man four-mile

mark was the result of a fine race, in which the Sagehens averaged better than 4.45 per man. Buster Sloan, Occidental's veteran two-miler, sprang a surprise by nosing out Pomona's sensational freshman, Snyder, on the first lap, but the prize upset was the wonderful mile turned in by Keech of Caltech, who registered close to 4m., 35a. Chandler of Occidental pulled up on the Caltech runners on the second lap, but Curtis of Pomona, running third, sent Handley off with a big lead over Carter, Occidental's hope, and the Sagehen captain held his lead neatly to the finish.

Charley Paddock furnished a genuine comeback in the open 100-yard dash, beating Cliff Argue of Occidental to the tape by three yards in 8 4-5a. Both Argue and Paddock got off to bad starts, but finished strong. Ed Redman, former California sprinter, was third. Charley Dagge of Pomona ran away with the high hurdles in the good time of 15 2-5a. He wasn't pressed.

MYSTERIOUS STRANGER

One of the big sensations of the day was the appearance of Charley Lewis, a mysterious stranger representing the L.A.A.C. in the pole vault. After he had won the event at an altitude of 12 ft. 5 7-16 in., it developed that he is the young man who played end for Occidental in 1914 and was badly injured later in an accident. He recovered and went to Cornell and later to Missouri and just now is engaged in making Doug Fairbanks famous in the pictures.

The pole vault was really one of the day's sensations all the way through. Five men, three of them high-school athletes, cleared the bar at 12ft. Lewis, Emmons of U.S.C., Smith of San Diego High, Bickmore of Huntington Beach High and Barnes of Hollywood, Lewis Smith and Emmons all cleared 12ft., 4'a.

Otto Anderson and Jimenez of U.S.C. had a wild battle in the broad jump, with Jimenez leading until Anderson's last leap. Oliver Corey of U.S.C. was the whole show in the high jump.

HOTLY CONTESTED

The high-school relays were hotly contested and exceptionally fast, the competition being the keenest in history. Pollock of Pasadena, in winning the class-1 100-yard dash, Greer of Chaffey in capturing the class-2 event, and Herschel Smith of San Fernando, national 110-yard intercollegiate champion, in capturing the class-3 century, were in great shape. Smith's 16g. 10g was sensational as he won called up.
