

# CARDINAL TRACKSTERS DEFEAT TROJAN SQUAD

## Superiority in Distance Events and Javelin Give Stanford Warriors Victory by Score of 75-56

Stanford went California two points better and defeated U.S.C., 75 to 56, in their dual track meet on Bovard Field yesterday afternoon, the Cardinals' outstanding superiority in the middle distances and a couple of the field events more than offsetting the individual brilliancy of Paddock and Otto Anderson in the sprints and hurdles.

Had the meet depended on the relay race there would have been no victor, Martz and Van Judah breaking the tape in an sensational dead heat as ever seen on any track. It was a heartrending race for the Trojans to even tie, for Martz made up over fifteen yards that his team-mates had dropped on the first three quarters and caught Van Judah in the last ten yards.

### MARTZ RUNS FAST 440

Martz's time for the final lap was caught by Dean Cromwell at 48 4-16, about as fast as the race has ever been run on the quaint University of Southern California track. The time for the relay was 2m. 24 4-16, Hughes running the first quarter for University of Southern California in 1:10, Smith making 1:10 on the next circuit and Johnson ripping off a 1:10 lap on the third round.

Next to the relay the best race of the day was the quarter-mile, which brought Mr. Williamson of Stanford very much to the fore, though the gentlemen failed to place in the point column. But "Blink," as his affectionate class-mates call him, set such a sturdy pace that the dusky Johnson, who tried to pass him on the curves for over 210 yards, was outgeneraled out of second place and Blondy Van Judah, coming up fast on the inside lane, passed him five yards from finish, Martz winning by five yards. The latter stayed behind the pace-setters until the straight-away was reached, and then lit out for home, winning in 48 4-16, the same time he made in the meet with the Bears the previous Saturday.

### OTTO REDEEMS SELF

The high hurdle race also provided a close finish. Otto Anderson redeeming himself for his defeat a week ago at the hands of Becker of California by beating Capt. Falk of Stanford to the tape by a thin whisker. Falk got away to the better start, but Anderson pulled up on him by the time the third hurdle was reached and from that point on it was a neck and neck race with first one and then the other forging momentarily ahead of his rival. Anderson was ahead over the last hurdle and had more punch to his final sprint than Falk.

With firsts in the high and low hurdles, the broad jump and a second in the 100-yard dash, Otto Anderson finished as high man of the day with a total of eighteen points to his credit.

My Charles Paddock, with firsts in both short sprints, and Norman Anderson, with firsts in the shot put and discus heave, were the other Trojan color bearers to break into the point column with two firsts apiece to their credit.

### CARDS WILL-BALANCED

Stanford's cinderpath aggregation is well-balanced, and dragged down lone points only in the 100-yard dash and broad jump. In four events the Cardinals swept the field, winning all the points in the mile, two-mile, half-mile, and javelin. Thus, in four events out of fourteen, not including the relay, Stanford had the going all to herself and copped thirty-six points.

Old Cap Rogers pulled on a shoe for his alma mater and finished across the line in the low hurdles for a clean third place, only Anderson and Falk consenting to run against him. After this burst of latent energy, Cap essayed to broad jump, but gave up the battle after a couple of leaps.

Mr. Paddock, the well-known sprinter, ran with his customary speed, and for the second week in succession tied the world's record of 11 4-16, for a curved track. The time in the 100-yard dash was 1-16 slower than the Trojan sprinter's average, the local flyer registering 10a. 8a. The summary:

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
