

# LION'S SHARE OF TRACK HONORS GO TO TROJANS

## Cromwell's Athletes Annex A.A.U. Meet; U.S.C. Fresh Finish Second; Oxy Is Third

University of Southern California's varsity cinderpathers captured the annual Southern Pacific Amateur Athletic Union track and field championship at the University of Redlands oval yesterday afternoon with a total of 45½ points. The U.S.C. freshmen finished on the heels of their big brothers with 42 digits, while Occidental grabbed off third place with 39½ markers to their credit. The Los Angeles Athletic Club nosed out Pomona for fourth place by a third of a point, the Mercuries totaling 29½ digits, while the Sagehens collected 29 even. Caltech finished sixth with 10½ markers, Southern Branch nabbed off 5½ points and Hollywood and Manual brought up in the rear with 5 and 2 points, respectively.

As expected, Charlie Daggs of Pomona and Otto Anderson of U.S.C. split even in their two hurdle races, Daggs drew first blood by breaking the tape in the high barrier event, but Anderson came right back and evened the score with a victory in the lows. Both times were exceedingly fast for such a cold day, Daggs being clocked in the highs at 15 1-8s., while Anderson's time in the low barriers was 24 1-8s., the latter being a new U.S.C. record.

### ELLSWORTH WINS

Phil Ellsworth won the half-mile in 3m. 4-8s., with Percy Niersbach of the U.S.C. freshmen following the Oxy speedster over the line by about two yards. Hansen, the Manual Arts 110 sensation, uncorked a terrific sprint and took third, Huber Smuts of U.S.C. finished fourth.

"Nick" Carter of Occidental romped in a winner by fifteen yards in the mile run after passing Loren Handley of Pomona with a last lap sprint. Handley was about twenty yards in front at the start of the final lap, but Carter ran a wonderful last quarter and finished in front with plenty to spare.

Johnny Powers of Oxy started out in the lead and finished exactly in the same position in the quarter. Aden Hughes gave Powers a terrific battle, but Powers was determined to stay in front and finished two yards in the lead in 16 2-8s. Spangler of Oxy beat out Shaw of the U.S.C. freshman for third place by a gnat's whisker.

Yale Martz of U.S.C. was victorious in both sprints, trimming Cliff Argue of Oxy. Argue gave Martz the best race in the century, the Trojan runner just nosing out Cliff a couple of strides from the tape. Otto Anderson took third in the 100 and Carl Lowe of U.S.C. fresh nabbed second. Sturry of the U.S.C. fresh and Darling of Caltech took third and fourth in the furlong.

### KEECH A VICTOR

Keech of Caltech scampered in a victor in the two-mile event. Buster Sloan and Lavelle of Occidental finished in second and third places, while Forward of the Los Angeles Athletic Club crossed the finish line in fourth place. Keech's time was 19m. 5 1-8s., which hardly compares to the brilliant 1:32 turned in by him at Stanford.

Alma Richards, the Los Angeles Athletic Club's "boy wonder," had a nice day at point collecting, cornering an even dozen markers during the frolic. Richards won the fifty-six-pound weight, took seconds in the high jump and discus and grabbed a third in the sixteen-pound shot. Richards also placed in the twelve and eight-pound shot events, but these were only exhibition events and did not count in the scoring.

Bud Houser did some good work for the U.S.C. peagreeners, winding the discus, taking second in the sixteen-pound shot, third in the fifty-six-pound weight and fourth in the hammer throw. Houser's heave of 147½ lbs. in the discus was one of the features of the meet.

### PEG WINS DECISION

Feg Murray won a decision over Fred Kelly in the two-hurdle races for octogenarians, holding Kelly to a tie in the 70-yard high stick event and winning in the 120 yards lows. The times of 8s flat in the highs and 13 1-8s in the lows were extremely fast for the two old-timers.

University of Southern Califor-

nia's relay team downed the Occidental quartet of quarter-milers after a spirited tussle. The University of Southern California fresh team took third in the relay, Spangler started out for Oxy, with Torkelson being first man for the Trojans. A burst of speed on the final stretch aided Torkelson to finish about a step in front of Spangler. Johnson started out about a yard in front of Garey and sent Hughes off with about a three-yard lead against Ellsworth on the third lap. Hughes, who has just seemed to hit his stride, handed Martz about a ten-yard lead over Powers on the final lap. Powers gained about five yards on Martz, but the Trojan speedster breasted the tape without having to extend himself much.

### NOTABLES ON HAND

Such notables as Charles Keppen, Bob Weaver and Gene Mahoney were on hand to lend the meet a dash of color. Mahoney, attired in knickers, ran Charlie Keppen a close race for being the favorite with the fair sex present. However, Keppen's "Uncle-John-like" voice won for him a hair-line verdict.

The Redlands oval was in perfect condition and Lloyd Young and his host of assistants deserve much credit for their endeavor. The summary:
