Almost 500 athletes, attired with the scantiness befitting the occasion, inaugurated the 1924 track season and baptized the Coliseum oval yesterday before the critical eyes of 3000 spectators gathered in the huge bowl to witness the annual A.A.U. Relay Carnival, U.S.C.'s representatives collecting the glutton's share of the points during an afternoon of thrilling events, while Hollywood High, Huntington Beach and Redlands had the largest total of points in their respective divisions.

Of the couple of dozen num bers on the program a few stood out as exceptional, both because of the records made and the com petition furnished. To Keith Lloyd, Trojan 'varsity sprinter. goes a generous portion of the L A. C. day's glory because of his performance in the open 100-yard formance in the open 190-yard dash. Lloyd won the seven in 9.3 seconds from a field of speedy men, after winning his heat in a walk in ten flat. Three prep runers, Kilne of Hollywood, Woodvard of Jefferson, and Elliott of Hundington Beach, are also deserving of praise for covering the century sprint in 19 seconds flat. EASY WINNER
