

TROJANS VICTORS IN A.A.U. RELAY CARNIVAL

Keith Lloyd Steps Off Century in Rapid Time; Hollywood Wins Class I Honors

Almost 500 athletes, attired with the scantiness befitting the occasion, inaugurated the 1924 track season and baptized the Coliseum oval yesterday before the critical eyes of 3000 spectators gathered in the huge bowl to witness the annual A.A.U. Relay Carnival, U.S.C.'s representatives collecting the glutton's share of the points during an afternoon of thrilling events, while Hollywood High, Huntington Beach and Redlands had the largest total of points in their respective divisions.

Of the couple of dozen numbers on the program a few stood out as exceptional, both because of the records made and the competition furnished. To Keith Lloyd, Trojan 'varsity sprinter, goes a generous portion of the day's glory because of his performance in the open 100-yard dash. Lloyd won the event in 9.9 seconds from a field of speedy men, after winning his heat in a walk in ten flat. Three prep runners, Kline of Hollywood, Woodyard of Jefferson, and Elliott of Huntington Beach, are also deserving of praise for covering the century sprint in 10 seconds flat.

EASY WINNER

Charley Daggs, erstwhile Pomona star and former Olympic athlete, again drew the lime-light when he won the open 120-yard high hurdles in fifteen seconds flat, in spite of the fact that he caught his tralling hoof on the last barrier and stumbled all over the track. Daggs was so far in front of the rest of the entrants that he was able to regain his balance, stop and dust off his nice L.A.A.C. uniform, and then cover the remaining distance to the tape before anybody could catch him.

Harry Smith, national inter-scholastic pole vault champ, floated over the bar at 12 feet, six inches, several notches higher than any of the other high-school and college stars could clear, and won a gold medal and five points for San Diego High in the process. Bickmore, U.S.C. frosh, and Graham of Caltech were second and third, while such men as Goodenough of Occidental, Emmens of U.S.C. and Barnes of Hollywood dropped out at a lower altitude.

LOT OF ACTION

The relays brought out a lot of thrills for the assembled multitude, although in most cases the times weren't of the variety to burst a stop-watch. The eight-man mile open furnished the best statistics, but little or no competition, U.S.C.'s varsity winning

without being rushed in 2m. 53.6s. Lloyd Hughes, Woods, Crumbles, Clark, Otto Anderson, Starry and Martz were responsible for this excellent time.

Hollywood High uncovered four talented quarter-milers in the four-man mile event for Class 1. Bill Smith, Campbell, Childs and Clum covered the distance in 3m. 32.4s., and although pressed by Lincoln's quartet, kept the lead to the bitter end. Lincoln had four 880 men worthy of mention in Farrow, Marvin, Yoshida and Searcy, who jumped into the lead at the first lap and kept it in spite of efforts on the part of Hollywood to take it away.

A duel between Manual Arts and Lincoln in the eight-man mile event was won by the Railsplitters, after a hectic race in which the lead shifted back and forth and the bugs in the bleachers had chills and fever for three minutes and five seconds.

Two gentlemen from El Monte, Unruh and Adams by name, gave the fans a little excitement in the medley race in Class 3, that former unbottling a dazzling spurt of speed at the tail end of his 880, while Adams scorched the track at the end of the mile section of the relay, El Monte winning first place by virtue of their exuberance when everybody else was dragging along.

Niersbach, U.S.C., passed up Phil Ellsworth of Occidental on the home stretch of the four-man, two-mile open relay, and hit the tape several strides ahead of the Oxy speedster for a victory in one of the brightest events on the list. Pomona was leading at the end of the first lap, U.S.C. had forged to the front after the second, and Occidental passed up the rest in the third section by virtue of Nick Carter's fast stepping, giving Ellsworth a slight advantage for the final lap. Niersbach stuck close to the Oxy athlete until the last 220 yards, when he began edging around, and finally pulled into the lead amid a lot of noise from the bleachers. The time was the only thing about the race that wasn't exciting—8m. 14.5s.
