Sagehen Athlete Gets Firsts in Three Events

Bud Houser Does Some Heavy Work for Trojans

Discus, Shot and Half Find Winners Supreme

Featured by the sensational work of Bob Maxwell, star Sagehen athlete who cleaned up three first places, yesterday's meet at the Coliseum resulted in the U.S.C. cinder-patch artists scoring a 90-to-50 victory over the Pomona College aggregation. granted long before the meet started. The big question of the day centered around Maxwell's ability to win his three events, the 100-yard dash and the two hurdle races. This the Sagehen start did with much eclat, busting the tape in the century in 10 4-10s, and then winning the high hurdles in the splendid time of 15 1-10s, with Dye of U.S.C. right on his heels.

WINS LOWS ALSO

Later in the afternoon Maxwell took on Otto Anderson and Ken Grumbles in the lows and trimmed 'em both, the time of 23 9-10s, drawing a well-defined expression of amazement from the crowd of spectators. Grumbles stumbled on the next to last hurdle, falling in front of Anderson, and didn't place. Anderson would not have trimmed Maxwell, but Grumbles might have as he was coming fast at the finish.

It was the work of the Trojan weight men that game them an easy win. Houser was called upon to heave the hammer, a Southern California conference event, and did nobly with a throw of 132ft. 8in. His toss of 47ft. 5in. in the shot busts the U.S.C. record of 46ft. 10in, which he set last week. In the discus Bud put some 146ft. between himself and the platter. Norm Anderson, Fay Thomas and Harry Hicks sided in the Trojans' clean sweep in the shot and discus.

SEVERAL SURPRISES

There were several surprises during the afternoon's festivities, not the least of which was the nine points the Trojans garnered in the half mile, which Percy Niersbach won without competition. Paul Stroud, Pomona runner, burned himself out taking second to Mike Ellwood in the mile and didn't run the half. The Pomona men who did were left at the post, however, and Smutz and Waterman finished second and third for the Trojans.

Earle Wilson had very little competition in the broad jump. Homer Frisbie, Pomona star, failing to show his best form. Wilson did 22ft. 5 1-2in., with Otto Anderson a good second.

The high jump saw Frank Hamilton clear 6ft. 1in. for a victory over Ross, Trojan athlete. Hill of Pomona tied with the U.S.C. man for second.

It looks as if the Pomona-Oxy meet, scheduled for next Saturday at Claremont, would be a whale of an affair. The Sagehens, taking an extra point in the hammer, scored 50 points against U.S.C. while the Tigers got 50 without the hammer-throwing event.
