

PENNSYLVANIA LOSES BY ONE POINT; CARDS THIRD

California Loses Three-Year Hold on I.C.A.A.A. Title; Trojans Finish Weak Sixth

CAMBRIDGE (Mass.) May 31.—The three-year reign of California in intercollegiate track-and-field ranks came to a close today when the Blue forces of Yale, sweeping to their first victory in twenty years, won the 1924 championships at Harvard Stadium after one of the most sensational battles in forty-eight years of I.C.A.A.A. history. Not only was the Far West's stirring challenge for a fourth straight title turned back, but it was done decisively, for two eastern squads, Yale and Pennsylvania, fought it out for premier laurels with the Elis victorious by the slender margin of a single point, 28 to 27, in a battle whose closing stages witnessed the shattering of three championship records.

Leland Stanford, main hope of the Pacific Coast to carry on as California had done so brilliantly in the past, gave her eastern rivals a mighty battle, but was forced to take third place, with 24 1-2 points, despite the heroic efforts of Glenn Hartranft, who led the Scarlet charge by winning both the discus and shotput with record-breaking performances.

Close behind Stanford came Princeton with 23 points, and Penn State, sensation of the meet, with 21 points.

TROJANS OUT OF IT

Distanced so far as championship hopes were concerned, were Southern California, which finished sixth with 14 points, and California, the defending champions, who barely were able to tie Harvard for eighth place with 13 points, a half-point behind Johns Hopkins.

Throughout the final struggle for points, which witnessed the keenest and most spectacular competition in years, the race for the title clearly rested among the teams which finished in the first five places. Back and forth advantages shifted with startling upsets increasing the uncertainty that existed until the final toss in the last event, the hammer throw. Here a Yale hero of heroes, C. A. Earl, came through with a third place, and the three points that spelled the margin of triumph over Pennsylvania.

The Quakers made a gallant bid for the championship that fell just short because the Red and Blue team lacked the balance which carried the Elis to victory. Pennsylvania concentrated her strength in the sprints, with Hill scoring a double sprint triumph in two smashing form reversals, and in the pole vault, where Owens was victorious, with Sherrill tied for second, but Yale spread its strength through numerous events. The Blue scored only one first place when Bill Comins captured the broad jump with a record-breaking leap, but piled up other points in both dashes, the quarter-mile and mile runs, low hurdles, hammer throw, pole vault and javelin.

VALIANT FIGHT

Stanford took battle valiantly, but lost its sturdy fight when only

three of the Cards' nine qualifiers scored in the track events. Hartranft, however, more than came up to expectations with his mighty work in the discus and shotput, where, in a battle of giants, he shattered both the championship and collegiate records with a heave of 49ft. 5 7/8in., only a half-inch beyond the best toss of Ralph Dilla, Princeton star, who won the event in 1923.
