Manual Arts Sets New Mark in Half-Mile Relay

Yale Martz Wins 440 in 49.4 Seconds from Torkleson

Daggs and Dye Finish in Tie in High Hurdles

Amassing the imposing total of 76 points, U.S.C.'s potent collection of cinder-path performers went through their annual formality of winning the Southern Pacific Branch A.A.U. track-and-field championship yesterday in the Coliseum, the Trojan frosh team following a weak second with 35 points, having nosed out the Los Angeles Athletic Club in the last event.

Included in the afternoon's entertainment was the breaking of a world's interscholastic record in the four-man half-mile relay, a feat accomplished by Manual Arts' quartet, composed of Hanford, Borgfeld, Williams and Requa. The speedy Toilers covered the distance in 1 m., 31.2 s., clipping .8 of a second off the previous record, held jointly by Pasadena and Hollywood. The Hollywood team gave Manual a battle, but Manual never relinquished the lead.

U. S. C. had a corner on the medals, athletes from either the varsity or frosh squads placing in every event on the college program with the exception of the two-mile walk and the pole vault. Ten first places out of the twenty college events went to the Trojan varsity, while the Peagreeners copped three firsts. The Athletic Club took two, Pomona two, Hemet two and Hollywood one.

The afternoon was full of excellent performances, the best marks of the day being hung up in the sprints, hurdles, half-mile and 440 on the track, while among the field events the pole vault, shot put and hop, step and jump were conspicuous. Keith Lloyd and Hershel Smith divided the honors in the sprints, the former winning the 100-yard dash in 9.9 s., with Smith and Brice Taylor tying for second, while the latter stepped off the furlong in 31.8 s., with Lloyd inches behind.

Yale Martz of U.S.C. covered the 440 in the best time he has ever been officially credited with when he broke the tape in 49.4 s., after passing up his teammate, Torkle-

son, on the home stretch. Percy Niersbach, another Trojan, startled the crowd by winning the 880 in 1 m., 58 s., the best time he has ever chalked up. Harrison of the Athletic Club, former track captain at Purdue, stuck to Niersbach all the way, but couldn't pass him up, the U.S.C. demon winning by five feet.

Charley Daggs and Leighton Dye, representing the L.A.A.C. and U.S.C. respectively, lived up to expectations in the high hurdles when they finished in a dead heat, stride for stride, in 15s. flat. Maxwell of Pomona permitted Nichols of Huntington Beach to nose him out for third, but came back with a beautiful race in the 220-yard low sticks, winning from the famous Morton Kaer of the U.S.C. Fresh in the remarkable time of 23.8s. Daggs won third place by a whisker from Dye.

Young Lee Barnes of Hollywood High defeated the best athletes in Southern California in the pole vault, his victims including such performers as Dick Emmons and Chuck Lewis of the L.A.A.C. Graham of Caltech, and Bickmore of U.S.C. fresh. The Hollywood athlete cleared 12ft. 10 5/8-in. by about four inches on his third attempt, which is a lot higher than he is in the habit of vaulting.

Bud Houser won his accustomed two first places for U.S.C. pushing the shot out 48ft. 8 1/8-in., and the discus 142ft. 5in. The only other double winner of the day was Glen Brubaker of Hemet, who won both the hammer throw and the fifty-six-pound weight events. He tossed the hammer 133ft. 5 1/4 in., and the hitching weight 27ft. 2 1/4-in., beating Houser in both events.

Otto Anderson, Trojan all-around athlete, entered only two events, the broad jump and the relay. He distinguished himself by tearing off his lap in 49.2s., according to Dean Cromwell, adding U.S.C. materially in overcoming Caltech's lead to win in 3m. 23.4s. He also took third in the broad jump.
