

WOMEN TOPPLE MARK IN RELAY

Pasadena Girls in Brilliant Track Exhibition

Leighton Dye and Chuck Eaton in Fine Form

Pomona in Second Place With Occidental Third

One of the greatest early-season track meets in the history of Southern California was staged at the Coliseum yesterday afternoon. Coach Dean Cromwell's U.S.C. athletes romping off with the major portion of the day's honors. It was the annual A.A.U. relay Carnival, run by a corps of experts, and brought out a regular army of perspiring young men who extended themselves to the utmost in their efforts to win fame and recognition. Only a few were successful, but these shone so brightly that the less fortunate toiling hundreds were lost sight of.

Here are some of the outstanding highlights of the meet:

(1.) The Pasadena Athletic Club women's relay team set a new record of 53.3s in the quarter-mile relay for those of the fair sex.

(2.) Charles Paddock, world renowned sprinter, made his appearance and ran the fastest 120 yards of the day on a relay team.

(3.) Leighton Dye negotiated the 120-yard high hurdles in the phenomenal time of 14.9s, the fastest this race has been run in Southern California for ten years.

(4.) Harry Smith cleared the bar at 13ft. in the pole vault, defeating Leo Barnes and Glenn Graham, both former Olympic stars.

(5.) Keith Lloyd showed his heels to a fast field of sprinters while winning the 100-yard dash in 9.9s.

(6.) Charles Eaton broke his own Southern California record in the javelin by tossing the long spear for a ride of 185 feet.

(7.) Bud Houser propelled the shot 47ft. 2 1/2 in. without even bothering to remove his civilian clothes.

(8.) Ejection from the Coliseum of one overzealous fan after he had given three or four officers of the law a merry battle.

It remained for the women to furnish the big thrill of the day. Running under the colors of the Pasadena club four lithe damsels smashed the mark made last year by the Eureka High School team. The old record was 57s. flat for the quarter-mile and the Crown City girls did the distance in 53.3s. The maidens displayed wonderful form, which isn't surprising considering that they run in regulation track unia. The Misses Alice Hayden, Nellie Doerschlag, Elizabeth Nelson and Ethel Nichols made up the winning squad. Girls on the second team were mad because nobody held a watch on them. They also broke the record, but won't get credit for it.

The high-hurdle race between Dye and Hob Maxwell of Pomona was perhaps the most brilliant of the afternoon. Both men won their heats and strangely enough both made the distance in the same time, 15.3s. Dye got the best start in the finals, but his hurdles closer and although the two rivals were running almost neck and neck at the three-quarters mark the U.S.C. star showed a burst of speed at the finish and beat Maxwell by a foot or so at the tape. It has been a long, long time since any local man has cut under 16 flat for the race. Not since the days of Fred Kelly and Fred Thompson have Southern California athletes been able to turn the trick.

PADDOCK IN FORM

Charley Paddock appeared as he had promised and his tremendous speed almost ruined one perfectly good relay race. It was the quarter mile, four-man event and Charley ran second to Van Judah, the former Stanford star. The ex-Cardinal was trailing a bit when he finished his 120-yards and placed the baton in Paddock's hand. Charley uncorked his famous side-arm sprint and caught his rivals, passed 'em and then started into the line to pass the stick to Vinson, U.S.C. athlete, who had been pressed into service in the absence of Loren Murchison. Paddock was coming with all the speed of a thoroughly frightened rabbit. Vinson failed to take note of Charley's rate of progress and

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before the Trojan knew it Paddock had flown by. The world's champ then had to come to something very close to a stop before he could pass the baton to his team-mate. This lost the team the race, Keith Lloyd beating Eddie Pollack on the final lap. It was a great exhibition, however, and the fans enjoyed it.

The Smith Brothers—Harry and Ralph this time—dominated the pole vault. Harry trimmed Lee Barnes and Glen Graham, the former clearing 12-foot 8-inches, but falling on the 13-foot mark which the San Diego youth had surmounted. Ralph took fourth.

Keith Lloyd ran a beautiful race in the century, but had to hurry to defeat Hugh Pinney of Pomona. Some of the favorites failed to place. Dunson, a new man at Redlands, grabbing third and Claves of Santa Ana Junior college finishing fourth.

Eaton's loss of 155 feet in the javelin breaks his old record by some 13 feet, he having held the former mark at 172 feet. The Pomona athlete is consistent around the 155 foot distance and is about the best in this neck of the woods.

Bud Houser wasn't given much competition and won the shot in his street clothes. Homer Frisbe and Lee Barnes finished tied for first place in the broad jump, the distance of 22-ft. 4½-in. being very good for this early in the year.

Charley Keppen did the announcing.
