

CHARLEY BORAH TAKES FIRST IN SHORT DASH

Local Stars Score 35 Points as New York Squad Totals 32; L.A.A.C. Outfit is Fifth

PHILADELPHIA, July 5. (Exclusive)—Hollywood took the East by storm today when the track-and-field team from the movie capital won the national senior A.A.U. meet, piling up 35 points to nose out the strong New York A. C. squad, defending champions. The Gotham team tallied 32 points while the Illinois A. C. men scored 28.

Coached by Dean Cromwell, University of Southern California mentor, the Hollywood athletes—most of whom are students at the Trojan institution—scored four firsts and placed enough men to outscore the best the East could produce. It was the third national track victory of the year for Cromwell, his U.S.C. team having won the I.C.A. meet at Cambridge in May and outscored all rivals in the N.C.A. meet at Chicago last month.

L.A.A.C. Team Finishes in Fifth Place

Dye Sets New Record of 14.6 in High Sticks

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ing a score of 15, as compared with 14 for the L.A.A.C. Other teams finished as follows: Boston, A. A., 16; Olympic Club, San Francisco, 9; Newark A. C., 8; and Century A. C., New York, 7.

Seven new championship records were made, one of the records being a new American mark. Two more new records were equaled during the afternoon program. Showing of all the athletes was considered nothing short of phenomenal, particularly in a driving rain flooded the track and field during most of the competition. The struggle for honors was so spirited that but one of the nineteen 1913 champions were able to successfully defend their titles.

The keenest sort of rivalry became manifest early in the games between the big pits of the Pacific Coast, Middle West and East. Incidentally an international touch was put on the proceedings when French, Swedish and Finnish athletes tried their chances with the Yankees with disastrous results.

A. C. Martin of Chicago electrified the throng with his half-mile running when he won by five yards in the new record time of 1m. 55 2-10. W. A. Caine of Indiana, Watson of Illinois and George Linsen, New York A. C., divided the place honors, with five yards apart. Tomorrow the decisions and the championships and association relay will be decided.

Harold O'Conor, Chicago A. A., leaped 6ft. 4 1/2 in. in the running high jump and supplemented his 1913 win to beat Chas. Harrison, Newark A. C., 6ft. 3 1/2 in., and Ben Dudley, Penn. B. B. A. A., 6ft. 3 1/2 in. Pierre Loden, the French champion, was fourth with 6ft. 1 1/2 in.

Chicago made a clean sweep of the quarter-mile run when Kenneth Kennedy and Oestrich, Illinois A. C., finished first and third, and Fitch and Aaker, Chicago A. A., second and fourth. Kennedy equaled the championship record of 48 3-16, when he won by three yards.

L. Casey, Los Angeles A. C., was best in the hop, step and jump when he got out the very creditable distance of 4ft. 4 1-16. Earl Wilson, Hollywood, was second and Homer Martin, Illinois A. C., the 1913 champion, third.

F. Morgan Taylor, Illinois A. C., successfully defended his last year's title in the 440-yard hurdles when he rather easily won in 56. Johnny O'Brien, Pomona University, and George Myers, Washington State College, split up the place honors.

One of the early competitive casualties was Frank Wemyer, the 1913 200-yard champion, in the initial heat of the century dash. The ground back of his goal-off got loose so badly that he pulled the back tendon of his right leg, putting him out of competition for the rest of the year. Another title-holder of last year, George O'Brien, Illinois A. C., stubbed his toe in the second heat of the high hurdles, while a couple of yards in front of the finish obstacle and finished but third, putting him out of the final.

The final of the 200 was a triumph for the Far West when Charlie Bernick of Hollywood, Cal., got the verdict by an eyelash in 24 seconds from Jackson Scholtz, New York A. C., to whom De Hart Hubbard, the marvellous colored athlete was third in the century. Hubbard answered the flapping broad jump demand with a wonderful leap of 20ft. 2 1/2 in., beating the second man, Paul Jones, Illinois A. C., by a full foot.

Clarence Houser of California was another champion to fall by the wayside early in the games when he finished third in the shot put to H. Schwabe of Wisconsin, who heaved the sixteen-pound missile 47ft. 10 1-16 in., with J. Cook, Kansas State University, second with 46ft. 11 7-16 in. Houser's best effort netted him 47ft. 8 3-16 in.

Lloyd Maltz, Boston A. A., took the mark at pistol fire and led a pack of twenty others home in the splashing race of 500 yds. Thirty yards back came Willie Goodman, New York A. C., who just beat Raymond Conner, Iowa State College.

The Far West came in for another title when L. W. C. Dye of Hollywood captured the ladder-climbing honors over the high obstacle by a narrow margin to beat A. Winger, Illinois A. C., and Stage Lister, Olympic Club, by the smashing performance of 14 3-16.

Mary Hinder, New York A. C., was the second champion to successfully defend her title when she out-paced through the track to coral the three-mile walking honors. Joe Freeman, a local club, trailed her home when Hinder beat her 100 yards in the new American record time of 23m. 25 1-16.

The Middle West scored but Hinder in the javelin throw when J. Cook, Kansas State University, threw the javelin 190m. 7 in. and established a new championship record. C. E. Hays, Chicago A. A., was second best, three inches back.

Homer of Hollywood made another for his debut in the shot when he triumphed in the eleven hour with the astounding distance of 111ft. 4 1-16 in., more than ten feet better than the best of the others. Houser was this event last year. This is a new championship record record.

Another 1913 champion was eliminated when Paul Harrington, Boston A. A., and E. E. Myers, Chicago A. A., by losing 10 feet in the pole vault, beat Leo Barnes, Hollywood, and Harry Smith, Los Angeles A. C., the last-named being the deposed title-holder.

Paul Cell, an Indian from Haskell Institute, Kansas, duplicated his six-time junior victory of Saturday by taking the distance-running matter into camp when he beat, among others, Anderson, intercollegiate champion of Purdue, twice both, former intercollegiate champion, was a long-up record of 2m. 51 1-16 in., establishing a new championship record.

George Sharkey of Miami University, Ohio, was a surprising surprise in the 200 dash when he won by a foot in 21 3-16, from Frank of Hollywood, with Jackson Scholtz, New York A. C., almost slipped.
