Roland Renfro, the Oregon sprint champion, is not yet eligible to ramble in a green shirt, as his principal's recommendation has not yet been received. Ken Wilcox, the Chaffee speedster, likewise is on the sidelines, which leaves the sprints to be taken care of by Bert Darling, the ex-Poly sprinter; Rocky Kemp, anchor man of the San Diego High School world record holding relay team, and Paul Borgfeld, a former Manual speedster.

Elam Kirks of El Monte is the main light in the 440, while his brother Orphus and Bill Arnold seem to stand out in the half.

The mile finds three admirable performers in Ellsworth Patterson of Poly, Blake Hanson of San Pedro and Warren Woodruff.

Jimmy Payne, national record holder of the low hurdles; Duncan Powers, Poly's star stick man, and Leo Adams, the Bay League champion, will battle for honors in the two hurdle events.

Jim Stewart, the one-man track team from Texas, is entered in the high jump, discus and shot. In the latter, Frank Labes, the national prep champ from New Utrecht in New York; Don Moses, L. A. High star; Harry Edelson, ex-Jefferson tosser, and Nate Barranger, from the outlying districts, will perform. Labes and Van Vliet from Covina are in the discus.

Cliff Walker, Santa Ana javelin tosser, Shaw of Selma and Selby of Bakersfield will engage in a spear-tossing contest.
