

COGGESHALL BREAKS MARK AS TROJANS SWAMP H.A.C.

Leds to New High-Jump Record in Bovard Meet; Borah Wins Both Sprints; Reynolds Shines

Henry Coggeshall, the "black sheep" of last year's Trojan track team, was bleached to a pure and shining white yesterday. Henry leaped to a new Southern California record in the high jump, clearing the bar at 6 feet 57-16 inches by authentic and accurate measurements conducted by Owen Bird, the well-known and justly famous A.A.U. official.

Coggeshall's effort surpassed his own old Southern California mark of 6ft. 4 3-4in. by nearly a full inch. The old mark was established in 1925.

The record leap was one of several shining incidents in the Trojan team's victory over Hollywood A. C. The latter team was not present in its full and most powerful strength and tumbled before the Cardinal and

Gold tracksters by a 79 1-3 to 34 2-3 score.

Coggeshall was something of an in-and-outer last year, but at the start of the season promised Coach Cromwell that he would settle down to some good steady jumping. He has trained religiously in good weather and bad, and had been sick for the

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past week, due to a cold incurred while working out in the rain.

Charlie Borah, the flashy sophomore sprinter, won both the 100 and 220-yard dashes for the Trojans. He navigated the century in the announced time of 10s. flat and ran an even 22s. in the furlong. In the first event one watch caught him at 9.8s., a second at 9.9s. and the third at 10s. flat.

Cliff Reynolds came through with two sparkling performances. He distanced Jimmy Meeks, the H.A.C. hurdler, to win the high sticks in 15.4s. exceptionally good time this early in the year. Not content with this good exhibition of form, he uncorked a beautiful jump of 23ft. 10 3-4in. in the broad jump. Morris Walker, the recent transfer from Riverside Junior College, gladdened the hearts of all concerned with a clever leap of 22ft. 1 1-2in. in the same event, to take second honors.

Percy Nierbach, former Trojan half-miler, running in the colors of the Athletic Club, turned in a snappy 51s. effort to win the quarter-mile. Coach Dean Cromwell of the Trojans found something to be proud of, however, in the performance of Percy Wallace, who finished with a remarkably strong sprint to run a close second in about 51.5s. Al MacDaniel, another Trojan, was close behind.

FAST BATTLE

Glooge and Lovejoy, both of U.S.C., staged a thrilling battle during the last 200 yards of the 550-yard run, with the former getting a nose verdict in the pleasant time of 2m. 2s. Spencer Beeter won the javelin for the Trojans with a creditable toss of 173 feet three inches, with Mort Kaer, who showed up for a chance, placing second.

Bud Houser, performing for Hollywood, won both weight events. He scored 46-foot 6-inch toss in the shot, and fathered a put of 147 feet 11 inches in the discus. Frank Labbe, crack freshman star, who was competing for the exercise, placed second in each event. He got a nice 44-foot 6-inch toss with the shot, and one of 136 feet 6 inches with the platter.

The four U.S.C. sprinters—Borah, Capt. Ed House, Herschel Smith and Johnny Parsons—finished in just that order in both dashes. Borah won the 100 by about two yards, with the other three grouped so closely that a blanket would have comfortably covered them. In the 220, Borah won by a slightly longer margin, with House just nipping Smith at the finish to take second. Parsons was twenty yards away from the leaders 100 yards out, but uncorked a terrific sprint to finish close up for fourth honors.

The quartet displayed an exhibition four-man 440 relay in preparation for the A.A.U. relays Saturday. The time, with no competition present to furnish opposition, was 43.1s. well behind the world's record of 41.5s. Smith and Parsons, running first and second, negotiated the first 220 in 21.5s. while House and Borah navigated the second furlong in 21.5s.
