

# HOUSE DEFEATS BORAH

## Trojan Track Captain Trims Sprint Star in Meet on Bovard Field; Heilman Shines.

Ed House, captain of the Trojan track team, defeated Charley Borah, U.S.C.'s national 100-yard champion, in the century dash at Bovard Field yesterday afternoon, running the distance in the laudable time of 9.9s. The Trojans were scheduled to meet the Hollywood and Los Angeles athletic clubs in a practice triangular meet but the latter team failed to appear on account of the mud, and the Orange H athletes furnished the competition.

As Hollywood has no sprinters of note, Coach Dean Cromwell had but Borah, House and Herschel Smith to use in the dashes.

Johnny Parsons, another of his hopefuls, is laid up with a bad cold. House got away to a beautiful start, while Borah was away poorly. The Trojan captain maintained his lead, and had enough left to stall off the closing rush of Borah at the tape. Smith was a bang-up third. The time of 9.9s. was all the more remarkable because of the muddy condition of the track.

House and Borah ran alone in the 220, Smith having been

ordered out to run in the quarter. Both got away well, and Borah went to the front rounding into the stretch. House uncorked a tremendous burst of speed to close a big gap near the end, but weakened in the last ten yards.

Among the other interesting exhibitions of the day was that of Les Heilman, Trojan varsity two-miler. Heilman was beaten by Pete Meyer, H.A.C. galloper, but a matter of some 100 yards and 18s., but his effort—it was his first two-mile hike of the season—in 10m. 10s., was something to cheer about. Gordon Smith, one of the heroes of the Stanford meet last season, was clicked in 10m. 23s., which also was pleasant to behold. Heilman felt no ill effects from his lengthy grind. He ran about fifteen seconds faster than was expected.

Meyer clipped off the two-mile

grind in 9m. 52s., and came back a short time later to trim Chesley Unruh by a whisker in the mile in 4m. 38.2s.

## NIERSBACH SHINES

Two quarter-mile events were run off due to the excessive number of entrants. Percy Niersbach of Hollywood, won the first, with Willie Lewis, Trojan sprinter, who was essaying the longer route for the first time, a bang-up second. The time was given as 52s. Harold Lovejoy, another Trojan, copped the second event in 53s. flat, a creditable effort. Niersbach also won the half in 2m. 1s.

Frank Labes, the frosh weight star, entered to give the athletes some competition, and won both the shot and discus. Hugh Hutchison, one of Cromwell's "white hopes" in the low hurdles, negotiated a 120-yard flight right behind Jimmy Meeks in 13.1s. The results:
