

TROJANS TAKE SEATTLE MEET

Borah Speeds to Victory in Hundred in 9.7

Local Athletes Capture Four First Places

Records Smashed as Runners Gallop in North

SEATTLE, April 29, 1917.—The University of Washington eighth annual relay carnival saw the greatest

smashing of records in its history here today when eleven former figures were shoved off the books in eighteen events. Cold driving showers threatened to mar the meet, but they blew over after the first event. The early rain made the track smooth and fast.

The University of Southern California

ried off the honors with four first

places, three of which constituted

new records. The Universities of

Washington and Montana followed

with two first places each, three of

which ended in new carnival figures.

The Huskies copped four second

places and U.S.C. three. Washington

State College won one second-place

event.

Four hundred athletes repre-

senting thirty-four institutions

competed in the record shatter-

ing. The teams represented line-

ups from seven Pacific Coast

Conference institutions, five

Northwest colleges and normals,

nine state high schools, nine Se-

attle high schools, and four

P.C.C. freshmen.

The Pacific Coast conference rec-

ord of 9.7s., made by Russell Sweet

of Montana at Stanford last year,

was tied today, when Charley Borah

of U.S.C. flashed across the tape in

the same time. The small crowd of

about 200 persons stood breathless

as the men raced down the lanes.

The runners were bunched at the

tape, with Borah leading his team-

mate, House, by two feet. Dean An-

derson of Washington was hardly a

foot behind House as the string

parted. Borah's time bettered the

carnival record of 9.8s. by two-tenths

of a second, also made by Sweet.

The records to fall were Class

A events, 120-yard high hurdles,

100-yard dash, two-mile relay,

shot put, half-mile relay and

mile relay; P. C. freshmen mile

relay and 100-yard dash; State

high schools, 100-yard dash and

half-mile, and Seattle high

schools mile relay.

Nearly two seconds were clipped

off the Class A mile relay, the last

event, when the U.S.C. quartet fin-

ished in 3m. 23.8s. The former rec-

ord of 3m. 25.2s. was held by Wash-

ington. At the end of the first lap

the University of Oregon was lead-

ing, with U.S.C. and Washington a

close second, and third, respectively.

Southern California gained the lead

on the second lap and was never

headed. Jimmy Charteris made a de-

termined effort to overcome the fly-

ing Sakers on the last quarter-mile

but the lead the southerner had been

handed by his team-mates was too

much. Charteris gained about twen-

ty yards on the Californian but still

finished about the same distance in

the rear to take second place.
