

UPSETS FEATURE NORTHERN MEET

Gloege, Payne Are Beaten in Favorite Events

California Relay Team Trims Trojan Gallopers

Talbot Proves Hero With Great Lap Against Smith

BERKELEY, April 14. — Asserting their power in the track events with telling effect, University of Southern California's Trojans registered their first victory of the 1928 track-and-field season today when they defeated the University of California team, 72 1-2 to 58 1-2 on the California oval.

Outscored in the field events by the Bears, the Trojan track performers came through as ex-

pected in the sprints and hurdles to settle the issue in decisive fashion. Troy scored 50 points against 27 for California on the cinder path.

SURPRISE WIN

The points Walter Christie's men garnered included an unexpected victory in the relay, made possible by the stellar performance of Lank Talbot, Bear captain and quarter-mile star. Running the last lap for his team, Talbot picked up fifteen yards on Bruce Smith, U.S.C. anchor man, and beat the Trojan flyer home by a full ten yards.

Talbot's performance was easily the feature of a meet which produced no new records and only few notable efforts.

The long-legged Bear captain quickly broke into his full stride and at the last turn he was only five yards in the wake of the Trojan pace setter. Talbot caught Smith 200 yards from the finish. The southerner managed to stay abreast of the Berkeley runner for a few yards, but gradually Capt. "Lank" drew away and chested the tape with ten yards to spare. Although no watch was kept on him, U. C. rooters believed that Talbot ran the last lap in better than 49s.

Had Charley Sowers, Troy's best quarter-miler, competed the relay might have gone to U.S.C. Dean Cromwell, Trojan mentor, surprised by holding his star out of the team race.

Talbot, however, had little difficulty in beating Sowers in the regular quarter-mile dash. The Bear was "boxed" on the turn but easily speeded past Sowers and Maxwell on the stretch and had a ten-yard margin at the tape. Maxwell barely beat Pratt of California out for third place. The time, 49 8-10s., was among the bright spots of the afternoon.

GLOEGE BEATEN

The meet's major upset occurred in the half-mile run when Kenney Van Tress, big Californian, con-

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quered Ed Gloege, Trojan mainstay and favored for first place. In fourth place and badly jammed by three U.S.C. runners at the final turn, Van Tress unleashed a tremendous sprint in the final 200 yards and passed both Gloege and Schurr of the southern team like a fast express. Gloege was beaten by four yards and Schurr finished another yard behind in the good time of 1:58 6-10. Van Tress now looms as a first-place winner for the Bears in their "big meet" with Stanford next Saturday.

The meet ran true to form so far as the final score was concerned, but it did not lack for surprises. The relay and half-mile provided two of them and the defeat of Jimmy Payne, U.S.C. hurdle star, in the low barriers by his team-mates, Alex Graham and Charley Webber, offered another upset for the fans to ponder over. In this event the Trojans scored their only clean sweep of the day. Graham led Webber home by a yard, while Payne was just able to nose out Skinney Johnson of California for the third place. The time, 24 7-10s., was more than a second slower than Payne's best. Score:
