## *Illinois Sweeps Field in Mile and Two Mile*

## *Invaders Cinch Meet With Two Places in Discus*

## *Payne Close to Record in the Low Hurdles*

In the closest meet since Charley Keppen shaved the pine boards of the old bike track with his head the

splendid track team of the University of Illinois gave the dope bucket a boot by defeating the University of Southern California, 64 to 62, at the Coliseum yesterday. The invaders scored 29 points in the field to U.S.C.'s 25 and 35 on the track to 37 for U.S.C.

It was a nip-and-tuck battle all the way, first one team and then the other forging into the lead. The Trojans were one point to the good, 59 to 58, when the last event—the discus—came around, the relay having been dropped by mutual consent.

Lyon and Kimmell captured first and third places in this event, bringing victory to the Illini and climaxing a meet which sparkled with brilliant performances.

### RAH FOR JIMMY

Chief of these was Jimmy Payne's low hurdle race, which he ran in the sensational time of 23 2-8s., 1-10s. back of Bob Maxwell's Coast record; Borah's 9 4-5s. in the 100-yard dash; the 4m. 26s. mile in which three Illinois runners—Stine, McElwee and Abbott—finished in an easy dead heat; Abbott's snappy 9m. 35 4-5s. in the two mile, and the half-mile by White of Illinois in 1m. 55 4-5s.

It was this latter race which cooked the Trojans' goose. They expected the whitewash in the mile and the two-mile, but they didn't anticipate the defeat of Gloege in the 880, much less the third place to which he was relegated by White and Hamless.

The Illinois boys let Gloege set the pace all the way, and then ran away from him in the stretch. White won "going away" by six yards from his team-mate, and Hamless was two yards ahead of Gloege. Orlovich, a quarter-miler, figured in the Illinois strategy in this event, and deserves a meed of praise, although he did not win any of the points.

The time—1m. 55 4-5s.—was 1-5s.

slower than Glogge registered in winning from Stanford last week, but his early pace was slower, and he lacked the driving finish of the Illinois boys.

From then on the Trojans strove mightily to make up the lost ground, but while they copped all the places in the low hurdles and first and second places in the 320 and pole vault, they couldn't hold their own in the high jump and discus. Illinois's 13 points in these two events after the Trojans were riding the crest with a total of 57 to 51, brought victory to the invaders.

It was a peculiar meet in that each team had four strong events in which it practically shut out its rival.

In the 100, 200, low hurdles and pole vault U.S.C. won 13 points out of a possible 20 while in the 880, mile, two-mile and shotgun Illinois captured 14 of 20 possible points.

The Illinois distance runners were so good that they made the long grinds look easy. After running a dead heat in 4m. 36s. in the mile with two team-mates, Abbott came out fresh as a daisy and walked off with the two-mile in the fast time of 9m. 35 4-5s. This is not a new Southern California record as someone announced, but it is plenty fast. Cleaver of Idaho set the coast intercollegiate record at 9m. 34 3-5s. in the conference meet at the Coliseum last year.

### ALL IN THE FAMILY

However, Abbott probably could have run faster if it had been necessary, but the only competition was furnished by his own team-mates, Capt. Dave Fairfield, who was ten yards back at the finish, and Novak, who was still farther to the rear.

One of the most spectacular races of the day was the 440, in which Sauer of U.S.C. held to a scant lead all the way, finishing a yard ahead of Nickel and Chambers. Maxwell was in second place until the last fifteen yards, when he faded badly and Nickel and Chambers raced past him to a close finish with Sauer.

Although he did not figure in the low hurdles, where Payne galloped five yards ahead of the field, Rogers of Illinois showed himself a good high hurdler by pushing Payne right to the tape in the high. The S.C. man was only a yard to the good when he broke the worsted, and Rogers was about that much ahead of Webber. Cliff Reynolds of S.C. started in this event, but fell on the third hurdle.

### CLOSE CENTURY

Timon of Illinois was ahead of Borah and Draper at the seventy-yard mark, but the U.S.C. flyers pulled away in the last twenty-five yards in the 100. Borah was two yards ahead of his team-mate in 24-5s., but Draper was only a scant two feet in front of Timon.

Illinois showed a double winner in the field events. Dan Lyon copping both the shot and discus. He is a better performer with the round ball than the platter, his 47ft. 1-4in. in the shot ranking up well with the top-notchers.

Leo Barnes took the pole vault easily at 13ft. 6in., and had his customary weekly trials at 14ft. 3in.—a new world's record, but didn't come as close as he did in the Standard meet.

The Illinois boys leave for home this morning. Coach Harry Gill said last night.
