Charles Harlow, national champion in the intricate art of tossing the javelin, and Jeddy Welch, a young timber-topper with great possibilities, wrote their own tickets for a trip to the Olympic Games yesterday afternoon. Harlow, a veteran campaigner, and Welch, with his collegiate career still in the future, provided the main fireworks of the annual Southern Pacific A. A. U. meet staged at Claremont.

The former Stanford wand-waiting wonder propelled the long spear 209ft. 7in., to establish what was called a new S.P.A.A.U. record. This is quite a heave in any company and unless Bro. Harlow loses his strong right arm between now and midsummer he should chalk up some points for Uncle Sam when the best javelin artists get warmed up over in Amsterdam. Johnni Myyra, the migrating Finn, did 212 feet or so in a meet here in 1925, but the local practice is to credit S.P.A.A.U. records to Southern California performers, so Harlow's throw betters several heaves recently turned in by Charles Eaton, who has been hovering between 200 and 208 feet all season. Eaton did not compete yesterday, due to an injured arm. Harlow's toss is the best made in the country this year, as far as we know, with the exception of the 215-foot throw credited to Wilmer Rinehart of Indiana last week.

### WELCH WINS HIGHS

Welch put on a burst of speed at the finish to negotiate the 120-yard high hurdles in the sensational time of 14 3-5s., the fastest race run here this season. Welch's time equaled the Southern California record held jointly by Leighton Dye and Bob Maxwell. Dye was second in the race yesterday, only the width of an amoeba's rib separating him from Welch at the tape. Jeddy had more speed after clearing the final hurdle and this won him the event. Both men look ripe for a trip across the pond. Welch has improved so steadily under the direction of Boyd Comstock that there is no telling just what he will do in the future.

The Los Angeles Athletic Club had no difficulty running off with high honors yesterday, the Mercuries scoring ninety-nine
